GERMAN ALIENS TO REGISTER

We call attention to the notice calling for registration of all German citizens above 14 years of age who are not naturalized on the 4th, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9th days of February.

This notice comes to us with the request that it be given widest publicity possible.

Failure to register is punishable by "restraint, imprisonment and detention for the duration of the war."

This action has been deemed necessary because of the explosions, fires and disturbances occurring to shipping and big war business enterprises, and which disturbances are the work of supposedly friendly personage of German origin. The alien enemy classification will place in government hands data with which to apprehend those guilty of treasonable conduct.
