rate of 14 cents, add to this his general school tax of 47 cents, add his road tax of his especial township and his bond tax for roads, his special school tax, his special bond tax for schools and the total sum will be the rate on each \$100 of real and personal property listed. Multiply this value by this rate and add to it the poll tax of any given district-as shown in the table above -- and the grand total is the amount of direct taxes payable to the Sheriff of Warren County.

These taxes are all self-imposed, with the exception of 14 cents levied by the Commissioners and 47 cents levied by the State for schools.
