

MORE THAN 3,000 AT NORLINA RALLY

State Office Approves Temporary Receiving Point For Cotton Pledged to Pool.

H. C. FLEMING IN CHARGE

Farmers and business men of Warren, their wives and children, packed Norlina on Friday for the barbecue and Brunswick stew given by citizens of the county and the business men of that town in celebrating the completion of the tobacco co-operative warehouse. A spirit of quiet satisfaction marked the mien of farmers at their new venture into salesmanship and the spirit grew more festive with the approach of night and youth for the ball given at Hotel Norlina by the young people of that town.

The program opened at 11 o'clock with a strong introduction of L. E. Rogers by Mr. B. B. Williams of Warrenton. Mr. Rogers, with the Field Service Department of the Tri-State Tobacco Association, filled the appointment of J. R. Banks of Kentucky, who was detained by sickness. "The new sales system is working," Mr. Rogers said, "in South Carolina and Kentucky. We can but help encouraged at the support the movement is drawing." Director Sam T. Peace of Henderson, who followed Mr. Rogers, explained address of more than an hour, the financial end of the new system.

The crowd left the speaking to join nearly 3,000 other Warren folk in the grove near the ball park where the people renewed acquaintances as the band played and where all later relished a Brunswick stew and barbecue prepared by Messrs. John Wilson, W. E. Hundley, Howard Hawks, J. H. Horton and others. The meal was served by the women of Norlina assisted by wives of farmers.

After the meal many remained for the Wake Forest-Norlina ball game, won by the Norlina team by a score of 4 to 2. The general program of the day was in charge of Warehouse Manager R. L. Moss.

More persons were present at the dance than the Hotel could accommodate. Spectators filled windows, doors and the lobby to watch youth have its fling and the festive spirit prevailed until past midnight when the town again assumed a normal appearance.

The contract for the cotton storage warehouse was let yesterday afternoon at Norlina. The building will be 100x100 ft. and constructed according to specifications furnished by the State Co-operative Association. A temporary receiving station, in the building formerly occupied by the Norlina Motor Company adjoining J. E. Miles' store, has been accepted by a State inspection official. Cotton will be received on or before Saturday, Sept. 9, R. S. Register said yesterday afternoon. All cotton delivered will be insured.

Mr. H. C. Fleming, a merchant of Norlina, will be manager of the temporary warehouse.

8th Grade—Emerson & Bander, Modern English, Selected Classics, History Hughes, Community Civics, Mathematics, Review of Arithmetic followed by Wentworth-Smith's Academic Algebra, Latin, Collar-Daniell-Jenkins-First Year Latin; Science, Caldwell & Eikenberry, with Laboratory; Spelling Chew's Practical High School Speller.

In larger schools modern languages, French, Spanish or German, may be begun in the 8th grade in the place of Latin. Vocational work, when offered, constitutes a separate course.

9th Grade—English, Briggs & McKinney, first book, Selected Classics, History, Robinson & Brested, European History, Mathematics, Wentworth-Smith's Academic Algebra, Latin, Four Books Caesar, Bennetts', Latin Composition, Science, Botany, Bergen-Caldwell or Hunter's Civic Biology, with Laboratory. Modern Language, Optional with school.

10th Grade—English, Briggs & McKinney basis for reading and composition, History of Literature, Long English & American Literature recommended, History, Robinson & Beard, Outlines European History, Mathematics, Wentworth-Smith's Academic Algebra through quadratics and progressions, Latin, Cicero, six Orations, with composition. French, Fraser-Squair—Spanish or German optional. Science, Chemistry-Brownlee & Others, First Principles recommended, with Laboratory.

11 Grade—English, Classics to complete College Entrance requirements, Mcmillan Pocket Classics recommended, Composition work based on these. History, any standard available text. Latin, Latam. Mathematics, Wentworth-Smith's Plane Geometry, complete. Latin Virgil, 6 books. French, Fraser-Squair with 250 pages selection reading. Science, Physics, Millikan & Gale, with Laboratory.

Township Organization Committees To Meet On Friday, September 8.

WILL GIVE MEMBERS NEWS

The North Carolina Cotton Association is completing its arrangements for receiving cotton from the membership. The storage facilities are practically completed, for Warren County they are completed, the financial arrangements for making advances to the members have been made, the grading division is ready and it now remains only to give final instructions to the members about delivering their cotton. The instructions are absolutely necessary to every member to avoid any misunderstanding upon his part.

In order that the Cotton Association may know that every member has these instructions and to keep them informed at all times, township organizations have been formed. The officers of the township organizations will meet monthly with the Field Representative of the Cotton Association and are given all the latest information concerning the operations of the Cotton Association and instructions which they pass on to the membership in their townships.

By this plan every member may keep thoroughly posted at all times if he will attend his township meetings.

The county meeting of the township officers and the Field Representative will be held monthly on the third Saturday of each month. The township meetings will be held every two weeks, except in the case some townships may want to have their meetings oftener or farther apart.

The first county meeting was held in Warrenton Wednesday, the first township meetings will be held in each township at the places named below on Friday September 8th at 3:00 o'clock. At this meeting the townships will arrange the dates for their future meetings. It is very important that every member attend this first meeting for the Identification Cards are ready and will be distributed at this meeting and the members will be instructed how to get their first payment from the Cotton Association and other information of importance to them.

Mr. John C. Burwell Buys Interest In Henderson Grocery Firm

Mr. John C. Burwell, formerly of Maysville, Ky., and later a buyer on the local tobacco market, will leave Warrenton in the near future to engage in the wholesale grocery business. The Henderson Daily Dispatch of Wednesday says:

"Reorganization of the Vance Grocery Company, wholesalers, has just been completed, with new officers elected and the new concern acquiring the entire interest of Andrew J. Davis, of Richmond, formerly of this city. Mr. Davis was the active head of the business before he left Henderson, and since then has been its president. J. C. Burwell, of Warrenton, has been taken into the concern as a new partner, and will be actively identified with the conduct of the business. The company does a wholesale grocery business only. The capital stock has been increased by about \$12,000.

"In the reorganization, J. J. S. Calaway, who has been secretary-treasurer and general manager for the past two years, becomes president and manager; J. C. Burwell, vice-president and treasurer, and J. R. Teague, secretary. Although the youngest of the wholesale houses in the city, the company has established its position in the local field."

Tobacco Market Opens Here On Tuesday With Full Corps of Buyers

Auction sales system of the Centre and Boyd's warehouse will commence here on Tuesday, September 5, with a full corps of buyers present. J. J. Tarwater, owner of the Farmers Warehouse, when interviewed yesterday, would not say whether he was going to operate his warehouse or not.

Indications are for a good price on tobacco. The Eastern Carolina and the South Carolina markets would indicate as much.

With more than two million pounds of the nominal crop of Warren claimed by the co-ops, much interest attaches to the operations on the open market this Fall and Winter.
