Stock Market Cause Increased Revenue

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Activity in the stock markets through 1928 was said by Treasury Department officials today to account for an 880,000,000 increase in the March income tax returns over that received for the same period a year ago, the total this year having reached \$595,000,000.

Such an increase was unexpected. Present indications were said to point to income taxes for the present fiscal year, ending next June 30, being the largest since 1921. It was said further that a treasury surplus of around \$100,000,000 was the probable surplus at \$26,000,000.


