Warrenton Man Re-elected Superintendent of Schools By New Board

(Continued From Page 1) nominated at the June primary and the choice of the people is carried out by legislative appointment. New members of the board are A. C. Blalock of Warrenton and W. T. Carter of Vaughan, succeeding Jesse Gardner and Miss Amma D. Graham.

The new board appointed school committees for the county. In the majority of cases the same committeemen were re-appointed. However there were two changes. J. P. T. Harris was appointed to take the place of Y. H. Bobbitt of Vaughan who has removed from the school district. George Bender succeeds Phillip Holtzman, who recently died, as school committeeman at Manson. The names of Warren school committeemen are carried in a table in another column.

Under the new school law county superintendents are required to attend a five-day meeting at Raleigh the latter part of April to study the new school law. This meeting will be held with the State Superintendent of Education, the attorney general and members of the equalization board. B. B. Williams of Warrenton is a member of this board.

The first Monday in May all school committeemen in the county are to meet at the court house for an explanation of the new school law.

Before adjournment the new board ordered that bids be received on the first Monday in May for re-conditioning and storage of Warrenton county school trucks.

Stock Market Cause Increased Revenue

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Activity in the stock markets through 1928 was said by Treasury Department officials today to account for an \$80,000,000 increase in the March income tax returns over that received for the same period a year ago, the total this year having reached \$595,000,000.

Such an increase was unexpected. Present indications were said to point to income taxes for the present fiscal year, ending next June 30, being the largest since 1921. It was said further that a treasury surplus of around \$100,000,000 was indicated. The last estimate placed the probable surplus at \$26,000,000. Treasury officials said the increase in income tax payments amazed them and was due chiefly to the fact that on the rising stock market there were few deductions for losses and much profit-making because of the low surtax on incomes. The revenue law of 1926, it was explained, reduced the surtax payments from a maximum of 40 per cent to a maximum of 20 per cent. This reduction, it was said, caused many persons to take a profit whereas if the high surtax had been in effect they would not have sold the stock.

Over one million citizens of North Carolina were reached in various meetings and extension schools held by workers of the agricultural extension service of State college in 1928.

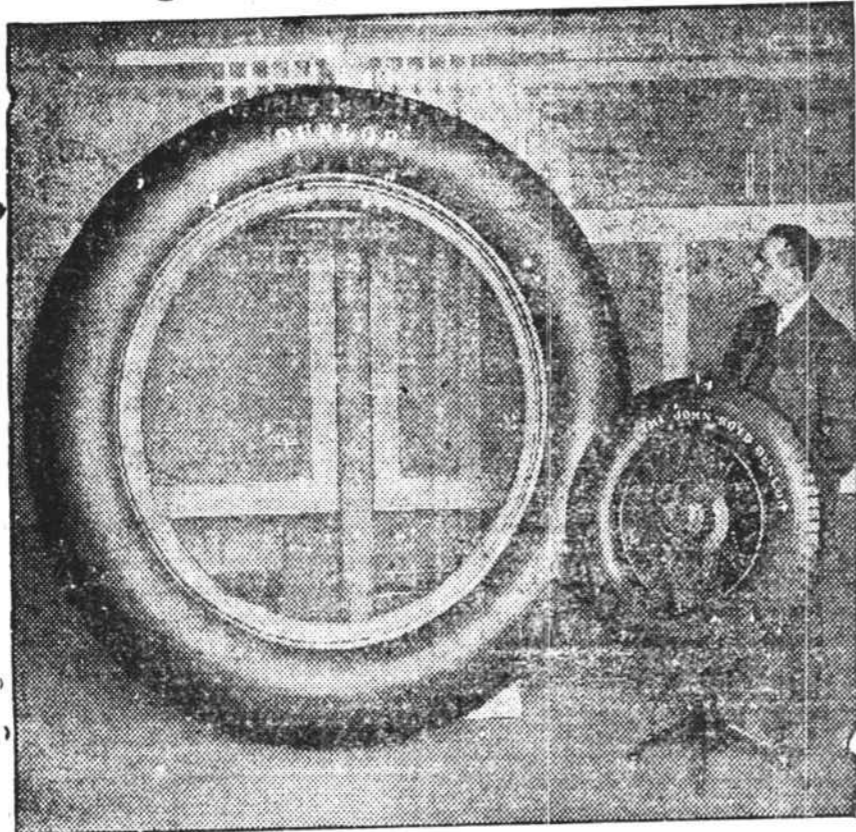

Big Dunlop Tire For Airplane



This interesting picture of the world's largest airplane tire was received today by Warrenton Service Station, Local Dunlop Tire Dealer. This large tire, which has been on exhibition by the Dunlop Tire and Rubber Company at an aviation show in Buffalo, New York, was made for a huge bombing plane. The tire is over 7 feet high, 16 inches wide, and weighs 200 pounds. An idea of its great size may be obtained by comparing it with Dunlop's super-automobile tire, the John Boyd Dunlop, which appears alongside. "The picture gives a rather startling outlook into the future," said Mr. Fleming. "While today we are selling only automobile tires, who knows but that in three years we will have a regular established trade on all kinds and sizes of airplane tires." A machine which will shell a bushel of peas in three minutes has been invented.

Improper Feeding Chickens Costly

RALEIGH, April 2.—Improper feeding is the greatest cause of poultry mortality among the farm flocks of North Carolina.

"Out of 1,800 sick and dead birds sent to the State College poultry disease laboratory for study, over 22 per cent die from diseases of the digestive tract," says R. S. Dearstyn, research poultryman. "Nearly 16 per cent died of diseases of the gland organs; a little over nine per cent died of nervous trouble and about 9 per cent of respiratory diseases. The percentages dying from other troubles were successively smaller. It is apparent, however, that disorders of the digestive

system may be the primary cause of death in several of these groups. At least 48.1 per cent might be attributed to this cause."

In his studies, Prof. Dearstyn found a seasonal tendency for the occurrence of respiratory and septicemic diseases. He also found that mortality from nutritional diseases had a seasonal occurrence which fact may be traced to a lack of green feed supplements during the time of the year when actual green feed is not available.

The studies made by Prof. Dearstyn will represent general conditions and not isolated cases for it is rarely that a poultryman sends in specimens to the laboratory unless the condition becomes epidemic. The occasional loss of a bird is not viewed with any alarm and some-

times this attitude is carried to such an extreme that a large number of preventable deaths in the flock makes it unprofitable. Death in the poultry flock does not con-

fine itself to any distinct age though probably carelessness in cubation may be a factor in the death of young chicks and adult birds later.
