

Time of the trial of John "Buddy" Macon, Harvey George and Rufus Fisher has not been determined. Macon shot and mortally wounded Sam Pinnel at the home of Bessie Mitchell near Afton on May 3 when the Warren officer, accompanied by Hunter Pinnell. R. L. Pinnell and Walter Mustain, attempted to arrest him. R. L. Pinnell was also seriously but not fatally shot by Macon at the time. He was captured by Hunter Pinnell and Walter Mustain after an exchange of shots in which the negro was wounded. E. D. Ormsby was found lying unconscious in the public road on the night of July 4. Before officers could remove him from the road he was struck by a car driven by E. O. Falkener who was accompanied by R. E. Saterwhite of Henderson. Investigation by a coroner's jury led the members to believe that Ormsby was fatally wounded and placed in the road and circumstances were such that Satterwhite and Falkener were absolved from all blame for his death. 




