

Portrait of Veteran Educator Unveiled At School That Bears His Name

#### R. B. HOUSE IS SPEAKER

Honor to the memory of John Graham, who served more than a half century as an educator of the youth not alone of this county but of other sections as well, was paid Wednesday morning with exercises in the John Graham high school. A life-size portrait of the veteran educator was unveiled near the close of the exercises which traced his life and influence in the community, State and Nation.

It came as a gift to the standard chartered high school which is upon the same lot where Mr. Graham spent the last 18 years of his life in the cause of education and was presented to the school as a gift from the 1929 graduating class, Mrs. Katherine Pendleton Arrington and from alumni. The life size portrait came from the brush of William Steene of New York and Chapel Hill. It was presented by Miss Katherine Pendleton Arrington for the donors and accepted for the school by Miss Margaret Kidd, a member of the first class to be graduated from the school after its official change of name from Warrenton high to John Graham high school.

Tracing the sturdy qualities exemplified in the life of Mr. Graham and paying high tribute to his thoroughness, Robert B. House, executive secretary of the University of North Carolina, wove an interesting word portrait about the high qualities of the gentleman in whose memory the exercises were held.

"He quickened a whole state and On December 12th made his presence felt in the nation," Mr. House said. Briefly he linked the old and new, with a tribute to Mr. Graham as one who always kept working for better things in education.

A list of the friends presenting the portrait was read by C. A. Tucker and messages from alumni were brought by Brodie Jones.

In accepting the portrait for the Board of Trustees, Senator Williams described Mr. Graham as a Ball of energy and a bundle of intelligence-one who gave his best to the task at hand and did not count the cost." He expressed the wish that the portrait might be frequently looked to as an incentive to pupils of the present day, that the lessons of Mr. Graham's life might be carried on.
