A FAREWELL

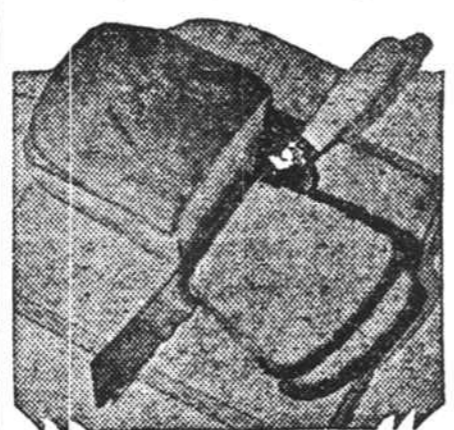

which is pre-leavened or prepared flour. Who doesn't like nut bread or for a change orange bread? For nut bread proceed as follows: 1/2 cup sugar 1 cup milk 2 tbsp. fat 1 cup nut meat broken in 1 egg 1 1/2 cups self-rising flour Place the sugar, fat and egg in a bowl; beat until thoroughly blended; add the flour and liquid alternately, then add the nuts; pour into a greased bread pan, and bake in a slow oven (300 degrees F.) about fifty minutes.
