Below is an analysis of the con project conducted by Mr. Liner, He produced 62.75 bushels of acre on a two-acre plot. The total on per acre was \$24.67, this included all of the items listed in the beginning. He realized a profit per bushel of \$0.19. A profit per acre of \$6.71.
