

Commissioners Adopt Tentative Budget; Rate 7 Cents **Higher Valuation Lower**

TAX BILL IS REDUCED

Warren County's tax rate for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1934, will be 66 cents on the \$100 valuation, according to a tentative budget adopted on Monday by the Board of County Commissioners and now on display in the office of Auditor P. M. Stallings.

Last year the rate was 59 cents, but this year valuations were reduced 25 per cent, allowing a substantial reduction in tax bill when compared with amounts for last year.

Total valuations last year were \$11,234,751. This year they are \$8,-691,336. During the past fiscal year it required \$67,734 to run general affairs of the county. This year \$65,431, \$2,303 less is the sum that
