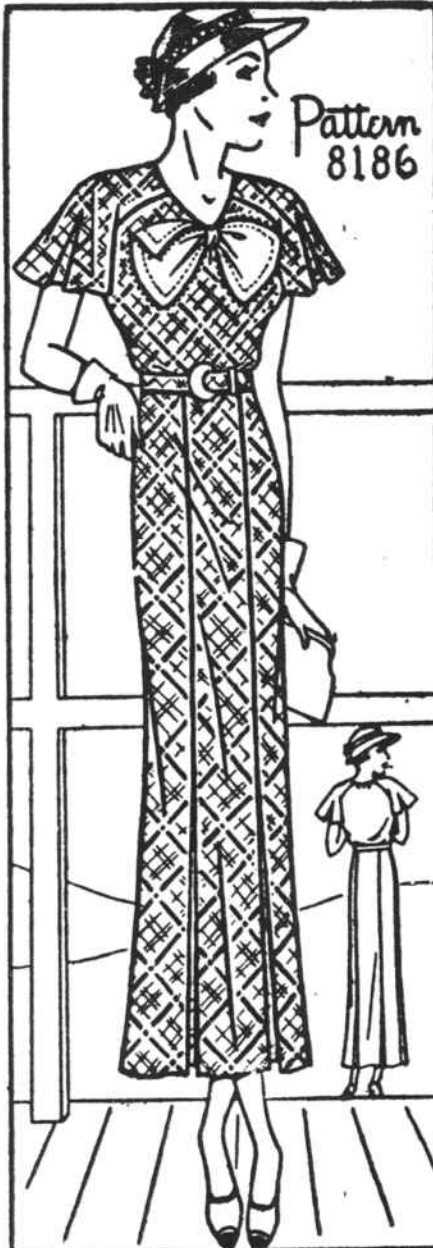

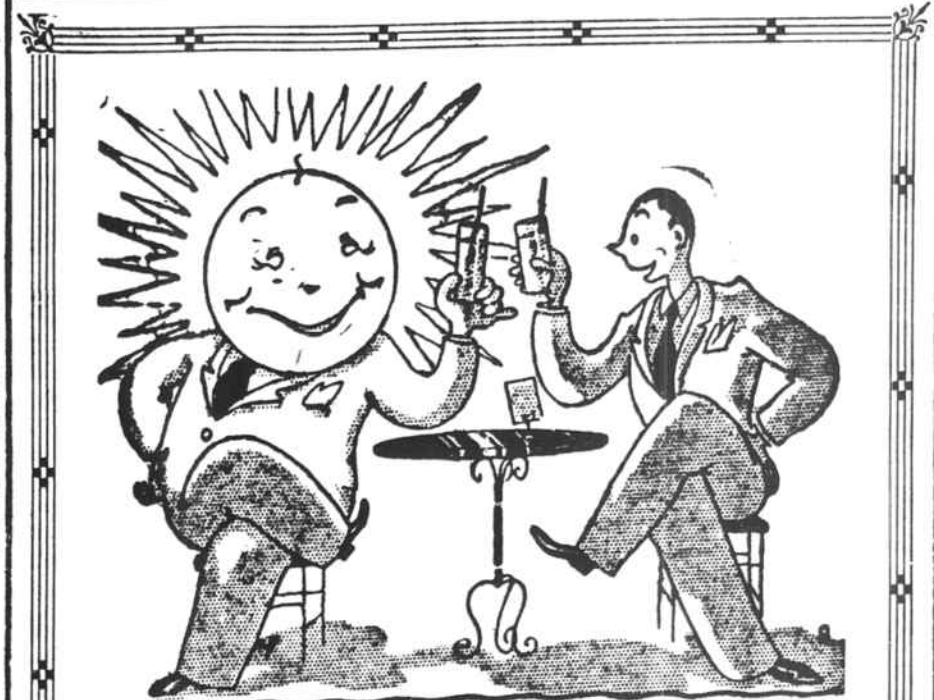
RETURNS TO WARRENTON
