BOARD MAY CALL FOR AN ELECTION

Members May Be Given Opportunity To Express Wishes On Whiskey Question

MEMBERS ARE QUERIED

Members of the board passed by the legislature permitting Warren to hold a special election to determine whether the liquor law can be lawfully sold in Warren. The board received here yesterday afternoon, and yesterday afternoon, requests were mailed to the members of the Board of County Commissioners asking them if they would like to hold a special election to determine what course Warren will pursue.

The letters which were written to the board, were received by the board, upon instruction of William Burroughs, chairman, point out the fact that House Bill No. 1491, which would hold a special election to decide whether liquor should be legally sold in this county, is not in the hands of the legislature. It is requested that the commissioners express their feelings known at once to the board by holding a special meeting of the board.

Should the commissioners decide in favor of holding the special election, it will be next Friday evening. The meeting could be held at the time before a special election of the Board of County Commissioners can be held, notice to be posted at the court house five days prior to the meeting and a notice inserted one time in a newspaper, if there is one. The election, the bill stipulates, should be held within 60 days from the date of the meeting.

It is thought here that the commissioners will vote in favor of the special election. Although all of them have not been seen in Warren since the new liquor law was passed, three of them have been seen, and two of these three stated the presence of a representative of this newspaper that they would like to be heard. The other member said that he wanted to come with the wishes of the people of Warren in the matter.

Harry Walker of Norlina was re-elected chairman of the board by unanimous vote and accepted with the understanding that he may later resign if circumstances seem to warrant such a course.

\$96,000 RECEIVED IN SEED CHECKS

Majority of Application Approved, Says J. C. Howard, Government Agent

LOANS AVERAGE \$85.00

Checks aggregating around \$96,000 have been received from the government for those making application for seed loans to carry on farming operations this year.

J. C. Howard, who is in charge of the loan office here as well as in several other counties in this district, said that 1134 applications, averaging around \$85 each, had been sent in from Warren county and that most of these loans had been approved. As the checks reach here they are recorded in the office of the Clerk of Court before being mailed out to their owners.

Farmers are still applying for the seed loans but the applicants are not swamping Mr. Howard's office as they did when Congress first appropriated this money and application blanks became available here. The first two weeks that the office was open farmers were received from only two townships a day; however, the rush has abated and applicants are now being received from all sections of the county at any time the office is open.

We spent from our Charity Chest during the month of April \$77.82 and had only \$24.19 contributed.

Stewart Not Guilty, Verdict of Jury In Recorder's Court

A Recorder's court jury said by its verdict on Monday night that William H. Stewart, well known white man of Sandy Creek township, was not guilty of operating an automobile while under the influence of whiskey but that he was guilty of reckless driving. Upon being fined \$25.00 and taxed with the costs in the action, Mr. Stewart gave notice of appeal to the higher tribunal.

The charges were preferred against Mr. Stewart as the result of an automobile accident which occurred near his home about two weeks ago when the car he was driving was in collision with a vehicle being operated by a Mr. Blythe of Northampton county. No serious injuries resulted from the accident, which occurred on a curve, it was said.

The verdict was returned at about 8 o'clock Monday night after the jury had been with the case for around an hour.

A jury also heard the case charging Mrs. J. R. Harris with obstructing a public outlet. She was found not guilty.

The case against Al Davis, negro charged with assault on a female, was continued until June 3.

SUPERIOR COURT TO OPEN MONDAY

Chief Interest Centers In Trial of L. C. Kinsey; Bank Case In Doubt

G. B. GREGORY IS SICK

It was learned last night that G. B. Gregory, one of the former officials of the Bank of Warren who are scheduled to face trial at this term of court for violating the banking laws, was operated on Wednesday for appendicitis. It is not known what action the court will take in regard to trying the bank case at this term.

Interest of the entire county will focus upon the May term of Superior court which opens here on Monday morning with Judge W. A. Devin of Oxford presiding. L. C. Kinsey, manager of the Peck Manufacturing Company before that concern was thrown into the hands of receivers a few weeks ago, will face trial on charges of issuing false warehouse receipts and embezzlement, in addition to being tried as one of the directors of the defunct Bank of Warren. The other cases of the week are overshadowed by the prominence of the principals in the cotton mill and bank cases.

C. N. Williams, former president, G. B. Gregory, cashier, W. H. Dameron, L. C. Kinsey, and John G. Ellis, directors, are charged with receiving deposits knowing the bank to be insolvent and with making false reports.

This case has been continued for several terms for various causes, but it is scheduled for trial next week, and it is understood that the defendants in the action will insist that the case be heard at this term.

Among the other cases to be tried is the state vs. James Terror, alias James Kessell, charged with breaking into a box car and stealing shoes and cigars, alleged to have been consigned to the Salvage Store and the Warrenton Grocery Co. of Warrenton. Levenia Terral, alias Levenia Brooks, will face trial for aiding and abetting in the robbery of the box car.

Rodger Falkener, James Daniel and Bennie Nicholson are charged with breaking, entering and larceny. These counts were preferred against them in connection with the robbery of Miss Wycoff's store at Ridgeway several weeks ago, Louis Bowden's smokehouse, and a garage at the county prison camp.

Judge Devin will also hear the evidence in the case of the state against Leona Maynard, charged with murder of her infant; Ben Howard, homicide; Dick Munn, breaking and entering; Frank Harris, drunk and disorderly; Washington Carter, non support; A. B. Conn, false pretense; Ethel Blackhall and Annie Thomas, house-breaking and larceny. Mac Moore is scheduled to face trial on a charge of transporting and possessing for the purpose of sale. The charge of manslaughter is still booked against Mary Beckwith, she having been called and failed to appear at the January term. James Watson faces a charge of larceny.

The case against the three Greensboro negroes who are charged with breaking, entering and larceny as the result of the robbery of The Spot Store at Littleton several weeks ago is not expected to be tried due to the fact that two of the men escaped from jail soon after their incarceration here and the other one has been committed to an institution for T. B. treatment.
