# Wheat Growers

We have enlarged and thoroughly overhauled our Mill. For the convenience of our custom trade we have installed a large Cleaning Machine in a separate house. This machine cleans 100 bushels of wheat per hour. It is on the first floor and you can see your wheat being cleaned. Your cleaned wheat is weighed and you take your weights to the mill for your flour and feed. You catch your wheat screenings directly from the machine. You can trade for several different flours as shown below:

For each 5 bushels of cleaned wheat we give:

One barrel of Plain Flour, bleached or unbleached and no feed, or, 185 pounds of White Dove Self Rising flour and no feed.

For each 6 bushels of cleaned wheat we give: 204 pounds of Cream of Warren Flour and 84 pounds

198 pounds of White Dove Patent Flour and 72 pounds of feed.

For 6 bushels of cleaned wheat we give: 186 pounds of White Dove Self Rising Flour and

72 pounds of feed. REMEMBER-You get your screenings back on each lot of wheat weighed in.

If you live a distance from Warrenton, phone or write us when you wish to bring a load. Tell us about how many bushels of wheat you will bring and kind of flour you want and we will bag the flour and have it ready for you. When we furnish bags the cost will be from 25c to 35c per barrel depending on kind of bag used.

We are always glad to see you at our mill and we believe you will get some of the best flour you have ever eaten. During the summer months we are open day and night and can handle large truck loads easily at night. It is usually better for the large loads to come in the afternoon about 4 or 5 o'clock. They can then go home after supper.

If you have wheat for sale we are anxious to buy it. Our present price is the Chicago quotation as printed daily in the News and Observer. See your daily paper for wheat prices.
