## ABANDON PLAN NORLINA STORE

### Control Board Unable To Lease Suitable Building To Handle Whiskey

### IS SOUGHT BY CITIZENS

Plans for opening a whiskey store at Norlina on Saturday have been abandoned. It was learned last night from J. B. Boyce, chairman of the county control board. Inability to locate a suitable building for the location of the store was responsible for the change in plans, Mr. Boyce said.

A site opposite the Norlina hotel had been selected for the location of the store and it had been tentatively agreed that Frank Weldon would be manager, but a hitch developed in the plans when it was learned that the building desired was under lease.

Mr. Boyce said last night that the control board had spent the greater part of the day trying to find a place in which to open but their efforts had been in vain.

Plans were made for opening the store at Norlina, it was said, as the result of requests which had come from Norlina, which went over-whelming for control in the recent referendum.

## Negro Agent Asks Hogs Be Watched

I have had a number of calls this week to examine sick hogs. In a few cases I found that the hogs were suffering from hog cholera. To prevent the loss of hogs by cholera in Warren county I am suggesting that you watch all hogs seemingly sick from any of the following symptoms: General sickness, weakness of the legs causing staggering, stiffness or constipation followed by profuse and fetid diarrhea.

If cholera is discovered in your herd, all healthy animals should be vaccinated at once and removed to non-infected quarters.

If there is any doubt in your mind of the sickness in your herd, let me know and I will be glad to look them over and vaccinate them if they need it.

In vaccinating your hogs the only charge is for the serum, the service is free.

## Making Plans For Tonsil Clinics

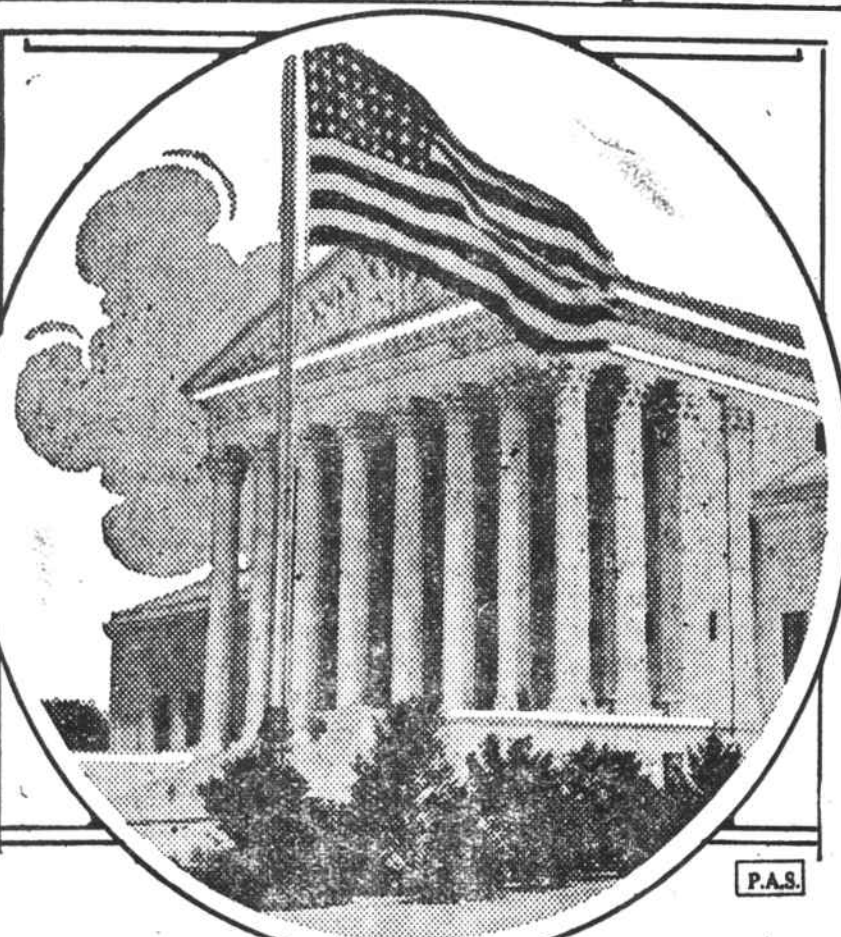

## Frank Lancaster Withdraws Appeal; Begins Sentence

The appeal noted at the September term of Warren county Superior court when Frank Lancaster was convicted of assaulting John Alston with a hoe has been withdrawn and this week the Odell farmer and carpenter went to the Warren County Prison Camp to begin the two year road sentence which was meted out to him by Judge W. A. Devin who heard the evidence in a tragedy which shocked the Littleton community and left the assaulted man maimed for life.

The trouble between the two neighbors was over a small sum of money. Alston claimed that Lancaster stopped him as he drove his car towards Littleton and after abusing him with profane language struck him across the head with a hoe. Lancaster claimed that Alston was the aggressor, that Alston came to his home where he was peacefully at work and that he—Lancaster—struck to protect himself.

As a result of the assault, Alston stayed for several weeks in a hospital in a critical condition from a fractured skull which brought on paralysis. In court here Alston's doctor stated that he did not look for much improvement, if any.

## JURY TRIALS ON FOURTH MONDAYS

### New Ruling Made By Judge And Solicitor To Save County Money

### FOUR CASES IN COURT

Jury cases will be tried in Recorder's court on fourth Mondays except in instances where a defendant is being kept in jail for lack of bond, Judge W. W. Taylor and Solicitor Joseph P. Pippen agreed this week.

The new ruling was made for the benefit of witnesses, court officials, and as a move towards saving the county money.

Solicitor Pippen pointed out the fact that frequently witnesses are kept in the court room practically all day for cases which are not tried and that by setting a certain date for clearing the docket of jury cases this loss of time and inconvenience might be eliminated to a large extent. "Of course I don't mean in cases where a man is in jail, for it would not be right to keep him locked up for possibly a month without privilege of trial," he said.

The solicitor also brought out the fact that by trying all the jury cases in one day the county would not be called on as frequently to pay jurors. "We can just draw one jury for all the cases," he said.

Judge Taylor stated that he was in accord with the solicitor's suggestion and readily agreed to setting aside the fourth Mondays for jury trials.

The new ruling does not effect pending jury cases, which are to be disposed of next Monday.

There were four cases tried in Recorder's court this week. Negroes were defendants in each of the bills of indictment, which included disturbing public worship; assault with a deadly weapon; larceny; and assault.

The charge of disturbing public worship was booked against Jesse Williams and Sterling Williams. Jesse Williams was found guilty and was taxed with the costs in the action. Sterling Williams was found not guilty.

Bryant Alston was found guilty of assault with a deadly weapon and was sent to the roads for two months.

Francis Green, charged with larceny of a bicycle, was sentenced to the roads for six months, with the provision "that his mental condition be looked into by Dr. G. H. Macon and if found to be such that he can get in some State Institution for the feeble minded or insane, then the road sentence to be suspended."

Josh Twitty was found guilty of simple assault. Judgment was suspended upon payment of costs.

A nol pros with leave was taken in each of the cases against Ray Weston and Nina Stacie. The state's chief witness, J. F. Godsey, has not been apprehended since he failed to appear in court last week after having warrants sworn out against Weston charging him with selling whiskey, assault, and running a house of prostitution. Nina Stacie is charged with fornication and adultery.

## Loyd Under \$300 Bond, Charged With Theft Of Tobacco

Clarence Loyd, known over the county as Buck Loyd since the days when he twirled the horsehides on baseball diamonds of this and other towns, and Horace Jones, negro, were on Monday bound over to Superior court under bonds of \$300 each to face charges of larceny and receiving stolen goods knowing them to have been stolen.

The former baseball pitcher and the negro farmer are accused of stealing around 500 pounds of tobacco from the strip room of J. E. Frazier on Wednesday night of last week and disposing of it at the Big Exchange Warehouse in South Hill on Friday.

The tobacco sold at South Hill in Loyd's name and later shipped by tobacco buyers to a prize house in South Boston has been identified by Mr. Frazier as his property. The defendants deny that this was Mr. Frazier's tobacco and claim that it was tobacco that was grown by Mr. Loyd on his mother's farm.

Mr. Frazier, as well as other witnesses, stated that the tobacco was tied in a certain way, that it had a certain color to it, and was spotted in such a manner as to enable them to identify it. Mr. Loyd produced a number of witnesses who testified that he had grown tobacco this year, that he had hauled the tobacco to his mother's home for stripping purposes, that he stripped out the amount which he sold in South Hill, that his tobacco was of unusually high quality. Mr. Loyd testified that it was his tobacco he sold; his witnesses testified that he produced similar tobacco to that which was sold on the South Hill market.

Jones was arrested after officers found tracks across a field leading from Mr. Frazier's strip-room to his automobile. Jones admitted that the tracks fitted his feet but denied that they were his.

## Make Plans To Finish Liquidation Of Bank of Warren

Plans for completing the liquidation of the Bank of Warren, which has paid 85 cents on the dollar since its failure in December, 1931, were discussed by representatives of the state banking department with creditors of the local institution at a meeting in the court house on Tuesday morning.

The upshot of the meeting was that a committee of five was appointed to appraise the assets of the bank, after which steps will be taken, in the event no objections are raised on the part of creditors, to complete the liquidation process by allowing notes, bonds, mortgages, or other evidences of indebtedness to be bought, sold, traded, or applied to the purchase price of any assets which the bank contemplates offering at public auction within 90 days. For instance, under the proposed plan, if one person has a credit in the bank, he may sell or swap the credit to some other person and this other person may use this credit to apply on the purchase price of any assets offered at public auction.

The plan, said to have proven practical in other towns in liquidating banks, was submitted by Smith Medlin of the State Banking Department. He was accompanied by C. I. Taylor, attorney for the liquidating agency of Raleigh, and Harold R. Myrick was present to represent the Bank of Warren.

The plan is to be filed with the Clerk of Court and notice of it is to be given in the county newspaper, it was stated.

The appraisal committee is composed of H. A. Moseley, chairman, George R. Frazier, B. L. Newell, Marvin Aycock, D. L. Robertson, and F. F. Limer was appointed as an alternate.

## New Law To Be Enforced

Raleigh, Nov. 1.—Enforcement of the drivers' license law, scheduled to begin Friday, will likely not take full effect until several days later.

State Revenue Department officials indicated Thursday that automatic photostatic machinery recently received here will speed up production sufficiently for the actual arrests of drivers without permits within the next few days when the number of permits mailed out catches up with the number applied for.

At the present time only about one-fourth of the more than 750,000 licenses applied for have been mailed out.

However, beginning Friday all passenger car drivers will be charged \$1 each for permits. Truck drivers have been charged a fee of \$3 all the time.

Under the act, passed by the 1935 General Assembly, all drivers were issued permits free of charge until after November 1.
