

Chairman of Board of Control Makes Report To Commissioners

GOES TO GENERAL FUND

Warren county has a net profit of \$1,190.25 from the sale of whiskey from July 22, when two stores opened in this county, to November 1, J. B. Boyce, chairman of the Control Board, told members of the Board of County Commissioners on Monday afternoon when he came before them to submit an auditor's report which also showed that total sales had amounted to 11,279.55. This profit goes to the county's general fund.
