Farmers Band Together And Buy **Terracing Machine**

Undismayed by the county's refusal several months ago to underwrite the proposition to purchase a terracing machine to be used over Warren county in protecting the land against erosion, a dozen or more leading farmers of the county banded themselves together and made the first payment on the purchase of the machinery and yesterday afternoon a large group of interested farmers gathered at the home of E. Hunter Pinnell to see the outfit work. The farmers who made the origi-

nal payment on the equipment pay so much an hour for the time the machinery is at work on their property, and they will permit the terracing machine to be used by other farmers at a similar cost What profits are made will be applied to the purchase price of the equipment.

The original investors are seeking to prove that the terracing machinery will prove profitable from a financial standpoint before they again endeavor to get the county to take over the equipment.

A delegation, headed by County Agent Bob Bright, appeared before the Board of County Commissioners about three months ago and tried to get the county to underwrite the proposition to purchase a terracing outfit, and members of charge. the board at that time expressed their willingness to do so provided Only One Case a large enough number of landowners signed a petition agreeing to have a certain amount of land terraced, but there was some question as to whether those signing the petition were agreeing to pay for the work or whether they were just advocating terracing as a county project and the proposition fell through.
