Young White Boys Jailed On Charge Attempt Robbery

Two young white boys, one from Pennsylvania and the other from New Jersey, were taken in custody on Sunday and brought to the Warren county jail to await trial...

The boys who gave their names as Painter Haynes and Robert Rappe, rode into Vaughan on bicycles which had been stolen from Raleigh and were attempting to enter the watch shop when the proprietor leveled a rifle at one of them...

The other boy sped away on his bicycle but was spotted sleeping on the side of the road Sunday afternoon by Patrolmen Paul Welch and Cooper, the latter of Henderson. Deputy Shearin met the patrolmen a few moments later and the boy was arrested on suspicion...

Deputy Shearin stated that the boy picked up on the side of the road admitted that he and his companion had stolen two bicycles from Raleigh, put them on a freight train and rode to Norlina where they were taken off and peddled to Vaughan. The boy had hid the bicycle in the woods before going to sleep but pointed it out to the officer after the arrest had been made...

The two bicycles were later identified by a man from Raleigh as his property and turned over to him.

The youths are also said to have started to break into Henry Heathcock's Service Station at Macon when they discovered that Mr. Heathcock had been awakened and was watching them.

Warren Tobacco Growers Asked To March On Raleigh

Warren county tobacco farmers are asked to join other growers of the state in a march on Raleigh next Tuesday to demand of Governor Ehringhaus that he call a special session of the legislature to enact a crop control compact.

County Agent Bob Bright received a wire yesterday afternoon from J. E. Winslow of Greenville, chairman of the Pitt County Farm Bureau, urging that all tobacco farmers and business interest join in the movement by attending the meeting at the College Stadium in Raleigh on April 21 at 11 o'clock.

The "march on the capitol" movement originated at a mass meeting of more than 500 farmers in Greenville on Wednesday. Leaders have expressed the hope that the 15,000 seats in the State College stadium, which has been offered for the meeting, will be filled.

County Agent Bright stated after receiving the wire that no plans had been made here for getting a delegation to Raleigh but that he was sure that Warren county would be well represented at the meeting.

Board Of Election To Name Chairman Here On Saturday

The Warren County Board of Elections will meet in the court house at Warrenton on Saturday morning at 11 o'clock, W. J. Bishop, the Republican member, stated this week.

The board will be re-organized at this time and a new chairman will be named, Mr. Bishop said. Fred Moseley was formerly chairman of the board but he has been replaced as a member by Z. M. Newman of Norlina. Claude Hawthcock of Churchill is the third member.

Mr. Bishop also stated that candidates must file by May 9 this year, which is about two weeks earlier than previously required.

Flower Show To Be Held In May

The third Flower Show of the Warrenton Garden Club will be held at the Library sometime after the middle of May, Mrs. John Burwell announced this week.

The schedule of exhibits for the show will be planned so as to allow entrance of all the flowers then blooming, she said, adding that the club is open to the public and the club very urgently requests others to make entries.

Besides the specimen of each variety, there will be a collection and arrangement of that variety; also wild flowers (named) specimens and collections; table centerpieces, formal and informal; mantle arrangement, with or without accessories. A space will be provided for children's exhibits.

The prizes will be given by the club members, or any other person who wishes to. The prizes are to be a shrub plant or bulb, a container or something pertaining to flowers.

"Our aim is to promote better horticulture," Mrs. Burwell said.

The schedule for the show and the rules are to be announced later.

Negro Fatally Hurt In Wreck

Elmore Brown, negro of Sandy Creek, was fatally injured on Sunday night about nine o'clock when the Plymouth automobile he was operating towards Warrenton on highway 59 crashed into a Ford which was being operated by Freeman Vaughan, Warren Plains negro. The accident happened about three miles from Warrenton.

When the two cars struck, Brown's automobile overturned five times, it was said, and caused him to be crushed in the chest and cut about the head. He was carried to a Henderson hospital where he died on Wednesday night. A Davis woman with him was not injured, other than bruised and slightly cut, nor were the four passengers of Vaughan's car hurt.

Excessive speed and failure to stay on the right side of the road were said by officers who investigated the accident to have been responsible for the collision. Brown's speed was estimated at 70 miles per hour, and it was said that unless his injuries prove fatal that charges of reckless driving will be preferred against him.

The Plymouth was badly torn up. Damages to the Ford were said to have been about \$125.00.

TWO CANDIDATES ENTER INTO RACE

J. A. Dowtin Announces For House; Perkinson Seeks Berth On Board

SENATOR FROM VANCE

The political waters of Warren county which had been placid until last week when a ripple was caused by one candidate entering into the pool of public support for a race to the House of Representatives began to swash a bit this week as the warm, fair weather brought two other candidates definitely into the race—one for the House and the other for membership on the Board of County Commissioners.

Rumors that J. A. Dowtin, for years a well known figure in the political life of Warren county, would enter the race for the House of Representatives were confirmed on Wednesday when he gave notice to this newspaper that he would be a candidate. T. H. Aycock, superintendent of the Warren County Prison Camp since it was set up in this county several years ago, announced last week that he would be a candidate for the House.

Coley Perkinson of Hawtree, who for several weeks has been regarded by some as a prospective candidate for membership on the Board of County Commissioners, announced yesterday that he would run for this place. Rumors are rampant that Ed Turner of Sandy Creek township will be a candidate for the county board, but they have not been publicly confirmed by Mr. Turner. Political wiseacres also give out the information that John L. Skinner and Sam King of Littleton will run for the Board of County Commissioners, but no announcement has come to this newspaper from either of these men. The present members of the board are expected to be up for re-election with the exception of Charlie Fleming who has stated that he would not run this year.

Sheriff W. J. Pinnell seems to be threatened by no opposition at present. It was talked at one time that Macon Thornton would oppose the sheriff but those close to Mr. Thornton state now that he has definitely decided not to run. Rumor also had it that Buck Baskerville would run for the place of high sheriff, but he stated to a representative of this paper yesterday that he was not a candidate for this office.

Likewise, no one has announced in opposition to Register of Deeds Joe Powell, despite the rumors that Jesse Gardner, Zollie Newman and Harry Fishel would enter the race for this position.

No rumors of opposition to Coroner Jasper Shearin or to the present members of the Board of Education prevail, nor is there any talk of opposition to Clerk of Court William Newell.

There will be no candidate from Warren county this year for the Senate, this place going to a Vance county citizen at the next meeting of the General Assembly.

R. E. Stevenson Dies At Macon

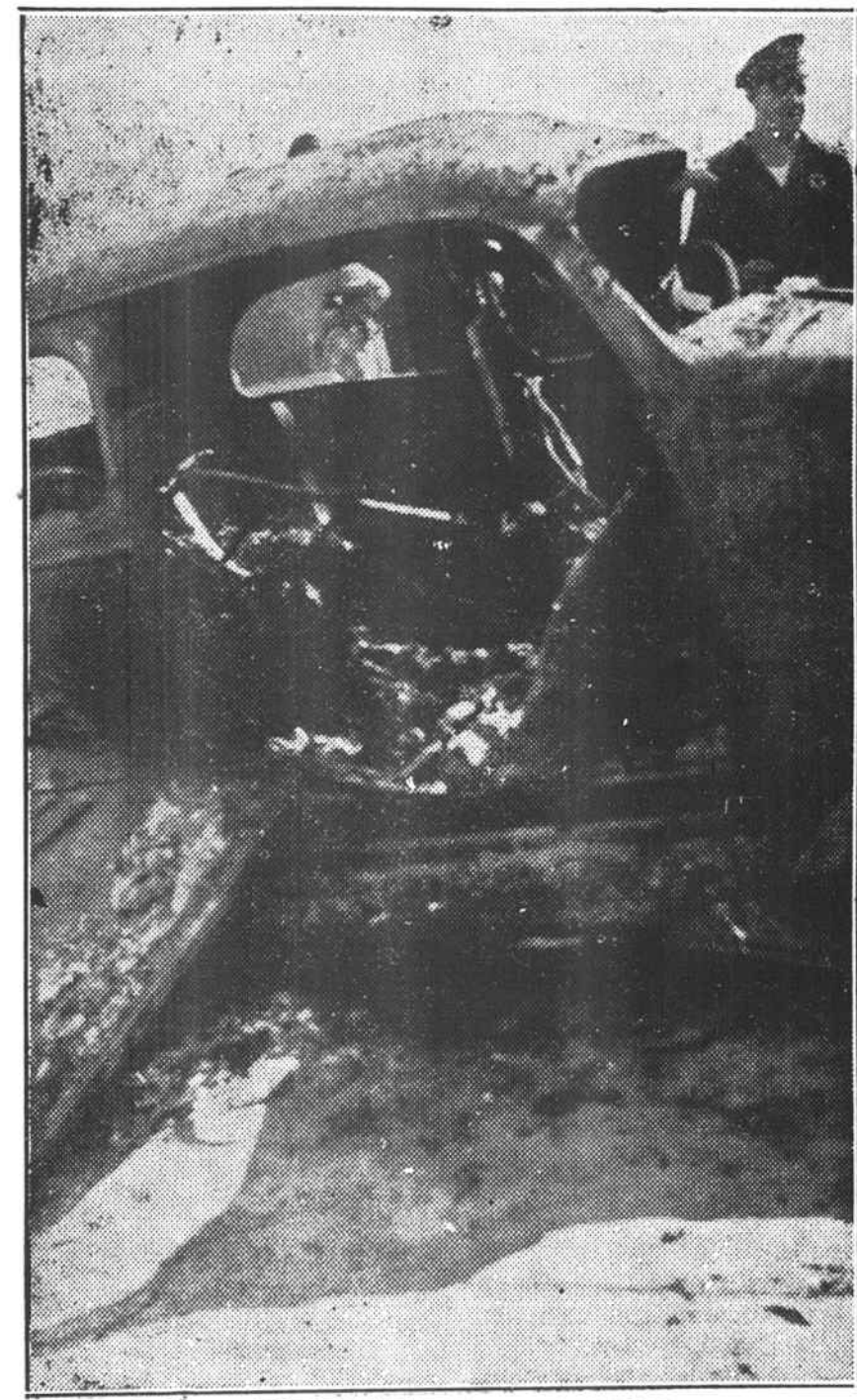

Negro Students Of County Win Honors At State Meeting

Negro students of Warren county made a creditable showing at the annual meeting of vocational schools, held at Greensboro last week, according to J. L. Bolden of Warren County Training School, and H. G. Rose of the Hawkins High School.

Bolden stated: "The 43 vocational schools for negroes in the state of North Carolina sent delegates to their annual judging and public speaking contests last week. The meeting was held at the A. & T. College in Greensboro.

"The boys from the County Training School did not bring back the number of medals that they have brought for the last five or more years. They centered their interest in another direction and succeeded in landing a seat for Joseph Pitts, a member of the tenth grade, as secretary to the state organization. Rev. R. H. Broom Dies At Ayden

The Rev. R. H. Broom, who served as pastor of the Methodist church here for several years, died at his home at Ayden on Sunday evening at 8:15 o'clock following a heart attack. He was 75 years of age and had not enjoyed good health for some time.

SIX PERSONS DIE IN FLAMING CAR

Burning Gasoline Covers Car Following Collision With Truck Near Wise

RESCUE EFFORTS FAIL

Six young persons returning to Townsville from a trip to Roxboro lost their lives a short distance north of Wise on Tuesday morning at 2:10 o'clock when the Chevrolet coach in which they were traveling crashed into a truck, burst into flames and turned into a crematory for four members of the party.

Two of the passengers of the automobile were pulled from the flaming wreckage by the driver of the truck and were carried to a Henderson hospital where they died later in the day, but efforts to remove the others were futile on account of the intensity of the heat which spread from the gas covered car and reduced their bodies to ashes.

The dead are Woodrow Tucker, 24, a farmer; his wife, Mrs. Woodrow Tucker, 23; George Newell, 21; J. P. Kimball Jr., 24; William Carr Tucker, 22, all of Townsville, and Miss Margaret Willis, 20, of South Jacksonville, Fla., who had been spending several days as the guest of Miss Helen Watkins in Palmer Springs.

Newell lived a few hours after reaching the Henderson hospital and Mrs. Tucker died there Tuesday night.

The accident occurred on a slight curve with vision unobstructed when the automobile, which evidence disclosed was traveling at an excessive rate of speed on the wrong side of the road, crashed into the front of a truck loaded with apples and being driven by Albert Quillings of Orlando, Fla. Neither Quillings nor Rase Sanford of Orlando, the owner of the truck who was riding with him, was hurt in the collision, but Quillings was burned about the hands and arms as he pulled Mrs. Tucker and Newell from the blazing wreckage.

As the car ploughed into the truck it tore off a gasoline tank on the side of the truck, changed ends and skidded off the highway on a wide shoulder, a flaming hulk. The highway and truck were also sprayed with gasoline and burst into flames. The truck ran across the highway on the left shoulder, its left front wheel being torn down in the crash.

Quillings testified that when he saw the car coming at a rapid rate of speed on his side of the road that he pulled the truck several feet off the highway.

He stated that he dashed to the flaming wreck and extricated Mrs. Tucker and George Newell. Mrs. Tucker was blazing at the time but her clothes were torn from her body, saving her for the time being. Newell was pulled from the car after his clothes had been burned off. They were riding on the front seat of the coach. Sanford was asleep in the cab of the truck at the time of the accident and by the time he became sufficiently aroused to discover what had happened, he was too late to aid in the rescue of those in the burning automobile.

J. C. Collins and Cleveland Bridgers, who live near the scene, rushed to aid. Bridgers said the highway was blazing with a film of gasoline for many feet, and that the car was enveloped in flames. He came to the side of the car and saw those on the back seat, believed to be Carr Tucker, Miss Willis and J. P. Kimball, two of them struggling to break out. He said the bodies were so entwined that rescue was impossible. Heat forced the rescuers back.

Bridgers stated that Mrs. Tucker was conscious when taken from the wreck, and that he assisted in bringing her to the Henderson hospital. He said she told him her husband, Woodrow Tucker, was driving the car. He said Mrs. Tucker talked on the way to the hospital, telling of her relatives, and whom to notify of the crash. She was said to have recognized a nurse at the hospital.

According to Bridgers, Newell had a hole in his head, and his clothing was practically burned from his body. He was unconscious, Bridgers stated.

Coroner Jasper W. Shearin empaneled a jury, visited the scene and exonerated Quillan of all blame of the crash. The jury was composed of C. W. Cole, Jim C. (Continued on Page 8)
