

Certified Seed Broadcast Subject

The value of certified seed in scientific farming will be stressed the organization of the committee Saturday in a radio talk on the abut one year ago. Carolina Farm Feature program by A. D. Stuart, extension seed specialist at State College.

Good results cannot be obtained if the grower uses seed about which he knows little or nothing. He is taking a chance that the seed may be from a high-producing variety, and again, they may be from inferior varieties.

For this reason Mr. Stuart is urging farmers to plant only certified seed. By so doing, they will be assuring themselves of a profitable yield at harvest time if the crop has been cultivated properly.
