Developed Chest Easy, Say Specialist

It is easy for a woman to develop her chest and fill out hollows in her neck," says a prominent health specialist who has taught hundreds

of women to gain as well as to reduce. According to him, a few simple exercises, practiced regularly, will do the work.

Here is one experience that is particularly recommended: Stand erect with your feet together. Clench your fists, making the muscles in your arms quite tense and stretch them at shoulder level out in front of you. Now, keeping the muscles in hands and arms stiff and uncomfortable slowly force your hands up over your head and down toward the back as far as they will go. Then try to force them down and back a few more inches. Feel the muscles in your neck and shoulders stretch and pull. Keep head up and chest expanded. Inhale as you force your arms from front to back. Exhale as you bring them forward again. Repeat twenty times.

The breast stroke you used when you learned to swim is excellent for a flat chest and hollows in the neck. Hold arms at shoulder level in front of you—palms facing each other. Then slowly bring them backward as far as you can. Keep on forcing them back until your shoulders actually hurt a little.

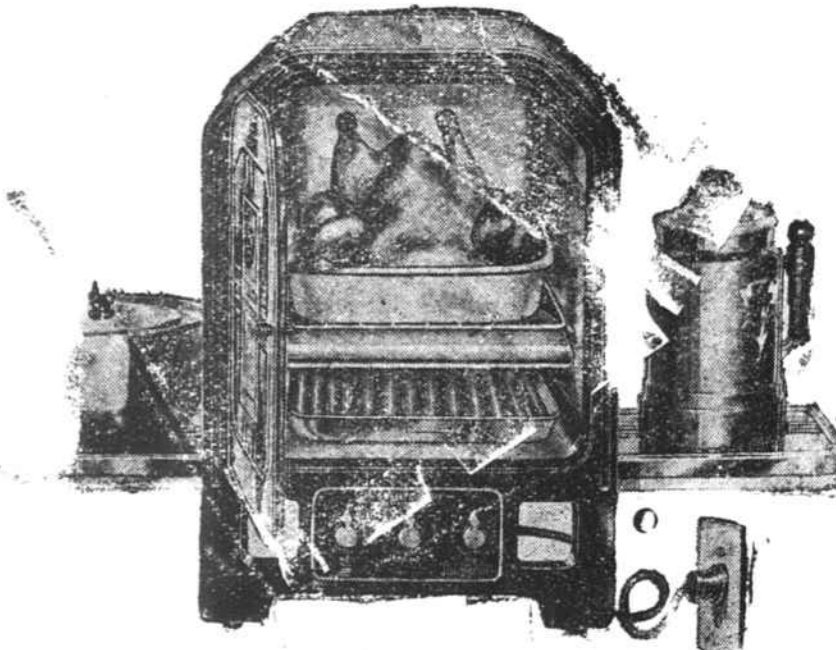
