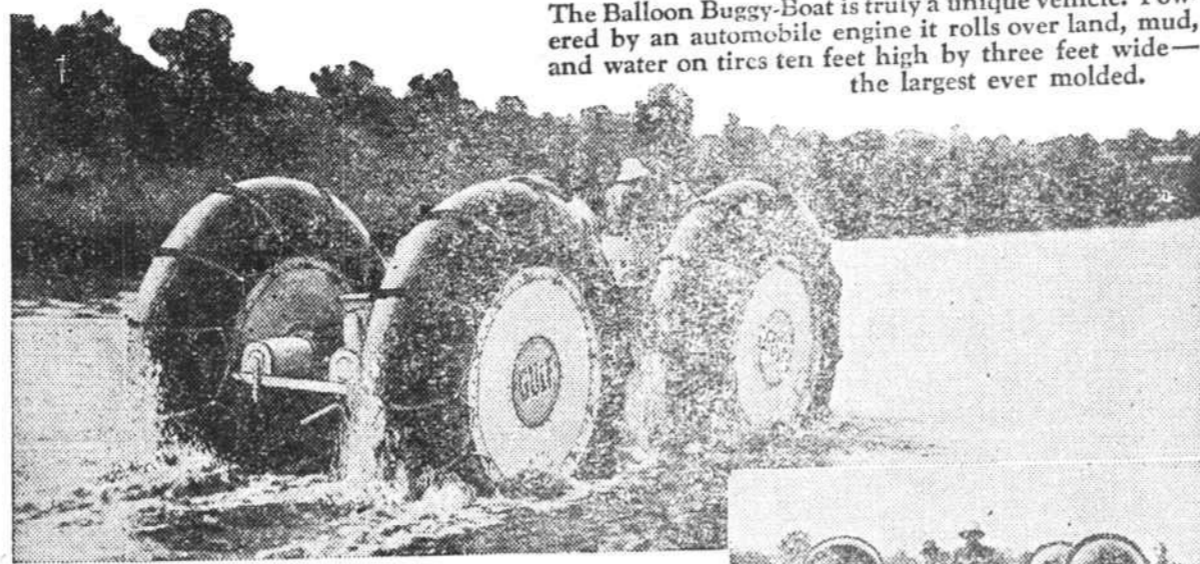

A BALLOON BUGGY-BOAT



The Balloon Buggy-Boat is truly a unique vehicle. Powered by an automobile engine it rolls over land, mud, and water on tires ten feet high by three feet wide—the largest ever molded.

Gulf Oil Corporation engineers call their invention a Marsh Buggy. It is equipped with all the marine requirements for Class 1 motor boats. Its displacement in water is two feet.



In water and mud the Marsh Buggy obtains traction from rubber treads pulled over the tires. If punctured, the tires can be inflated while the machine is in motion by starting a small air compressor.

THE 7500 pound Marsh Buggy is used to transport Gulf geophysicists, together with their equipment, into the Louisiana marshes where they search for oil. The huge machine, which combines the basic principles of motor car, tractor, and boat, has a top speed of 35 miles an hour on firm ground, 12 miles an hour in waist deep mud and mire, and 6 knots in water.

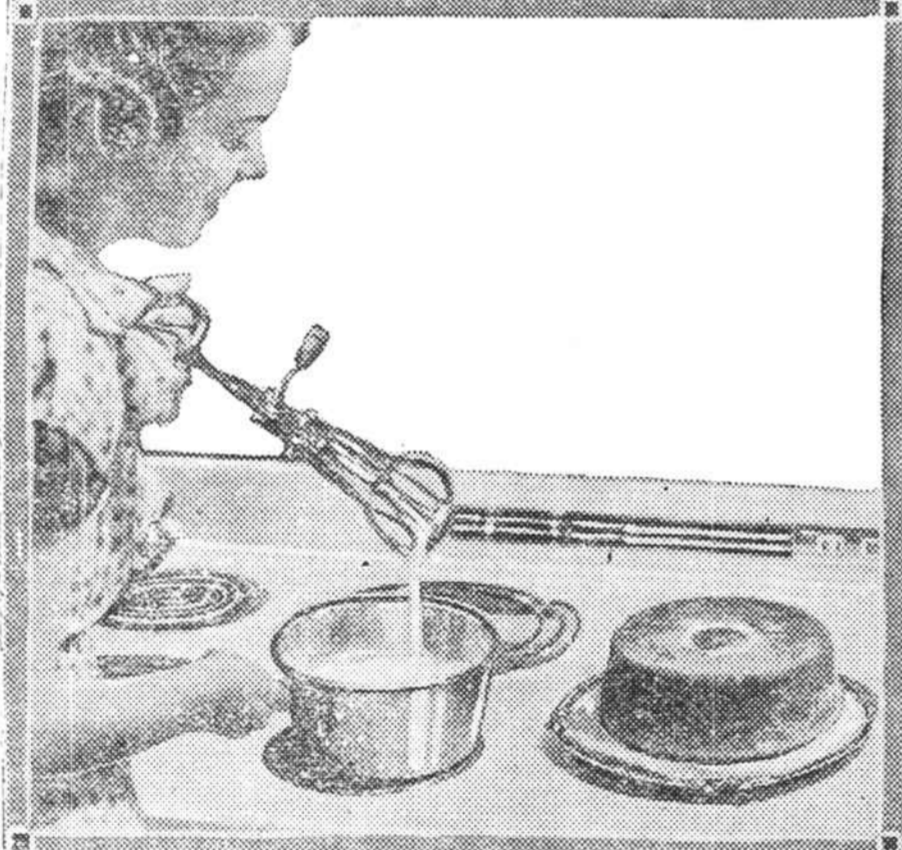
Madison County farmers held their first live-at-home show in Marshall last week with over 500 persons present and with excellent exhibits of tobacco and live-at-home products.

A DOUBLE MIRACLE



THE delicious angel food cake, shown at the right, is only one of the cooking miracles which the modern Hotpoint electric range performs. The other miracle is the seven-minute icing which the homemaker is preparing. The cake was baked in the draftless electric oven in which the heat is perfectly controlled during the entire baking process. It was started, however, in an unpreheated oven. As a result of this process, which has been termed "one-step" baking, the cake is extremely fine in texture, moist and lofty in height. The seven-minute icing was cooked in an ordinary saucepan over the heat-controlled surface unit of the electric range, turned to LOW, instead of in a double boiler as is usually done. This method saves time, temper and also fuel.
