## IS CRITICALLY **BURNED IN CAR** WRECK HERE

Pulled From Blazing Automobile Which Ignites As Searcher Strikes Match In Rescue Effort

IS CARRIED TO HOSPITAL

Driver of Car Removed To Service Station On Back Of Colored Miller

Miss Katherine Coleman, 31vear-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas C. Coleman of Paschall. was critically burned about 3 o'clock Wednesday morning when the Ford coach in which she was riding with Herbert Merritt, 21-year-old employee of the State Garage in Weldon, failed to make the curve at Neal's service station near Warrenton, crashed through a wire fence and dropped over an embankment into a creek.

Merritt, who is said to have borrowed the car from William Shearin of Weldon to take Miss Coleman from Weston's filling station near Weldon, where she worked as a waitress, to her home near Wise, suffered a severe shock and minor injuries but he is expected to re-

As the car dived over the embankment to the edge of the creek after ripping down a section of the wire fence, the force of the crash awakened Isaac Powell, negro employee of Jones' mill who lives nearby, and he went to the scene of the accident to make an investi-

Standing on the bank and shouting, "What's the matter down there?" a voice answered Isaac saying unto him, "Help me; I can't move; my back is broken."

Powell then went to the car, succeeded in getting Merritt on his back and carried him to Neal's service station where he awakened attendants to give assistance.

As he carried the injured man to the service station, Powell said he asked if there was not some one with him and Merritt, in a supor, replied that there was not. Under the impression that he had heard other groans as he removed Merritt, the negro went back to the car and struck a match to see if any one else was there. As the match ignited, the car leaped into flames plodedwhich revealed Miss Coleman lying part of the way out of the automobile. She was pulled from the inferno by Clinton Neal and Clyde Wagner, who rushed from the service station with Powell after Merritt had been brought there.


