Everyday Cooking Miracles

Homemakers, do you ever find yourselves getting into a culinary rut? Do you find that your menus begin to have a certain sameness? If so, it is the easiest thing in the world to understand, for every family has its certain favorite, and every homemaker is tempted to

melted butter and season with salt and pepper. Place on rack in broiler; turn over switch to Broil. Set temperature control beyond Very Hot. When unit is a cherry red, place broiler pan under the top unit. Broil, turning once or twice, for 10-15 minutes, or until the

lamb is cooked to the desired degree of doneness. Before placing the Lamb en Brochette on the broiler rack, however, place cooked peas in the broiler pan. They will be enveloped in the savoriness of lamb, mushrooms and pineapple juices as they drip through the broiler rack. Doesn't the very sound of this "miracle" broiled dinner make you hungry? But it's going to make your family even hungrier. They'll "fall to" with all the vim and vigor of expert trenchermen. Ham served in this same way is equally delicious, or chicken livers wrapped in bacon strips. For the peas you might substitute whole kernel canned corn or parboiled asparagus.

No Smoke and Splatter
Homemakers are delighted to find that the broiler of the Hotpoint electric range eliminates those twin bugbears—smoke and splatter—that have so long been associated with broiling. They are finding the electric broiler method so safe, so clean. For with the elimination of splattering, which shot grease in all directions, the homemaker is no longer faced with the unpleasant task of "going over" her range after preparing a broiled dinner.

Easy Broiled Dinner
And now let me tell you about an "easy-to-do" broiled dinner. First, impale on a skewer a cubed piece of lamb (shoulder of lamb will do very nicely for this recipe), then quarter a slice of pineapple (heated in green tinted pineapple juice, if you want to go "ritzy"), and place one-quarter on the skewer, then another piece of lamb, then add a fresh mushroom, another cube of lamb and so on until the skewer is full.
