

\$5,000 Estimate Of Cost **Of 5-Year County Audit**

Delay In Handling Pension Forms Is Costly, Says Agent

Endeavoring to place this county in a position so in the future it will not lose thousands of dollars in benefit checks due eligible persons under provisions of the Social Security Act, Clark W. Blackburn field social work representative for the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, suggested to members of the Board of County Commissioners on Monday afternoon that they place a trained interviewer in the County Welfare Office in order that the cases of those making application for old age assistance may be investigated with more speed and the names of those eligible to receive funds certified to

the Rleigh office. Mr. Blackburn made this suggestion after informing the commissioners that \$24,000 was the annual allotment for Warren county to carry out the various phases of relief offered under the Social Security Act and that through January, which coves the seven months period that the program has been in effect, only \$4,911 has been paid through this county to eligible persons. He stated that through January 136 persons had received old age assistance checks and that if all the daims hd been in the county

would have received around \$2,000 in January rather than the \$1,085 that it did receive. The field worker said that the

claims are not retroactive, that there was no way of ever getting the money for those entitled to it on the grounds that they were eligible when the program was first set up even though their claims did not reach Raleigh until months later.

Mr. Blackburn stated that when the Social Security Act swung into effect in North Carolina that the County Welfare Offices sprung into vast importance and placed many additional duties and problems on the welfare officer. He suggested a trained interviewer to relieve the situation.

The commissioners took no action on the matter Monday but are expected to do so at an early date.

Board Offers Low Rate Interest **On County Bonds**

Two and one-half per cent a year, payable semi-annually, was the rate of interest the Board of County Commissioners, in regular session on Monday, agreed to offer the purchaser of the \$5,000 worth of county bonds which are being placed on the market to raise money to cover the cost of repair-

Commissioners Confer With Grand Jury Members Behind Locked Doors

ASK JURORS FOR ADVICE

Meeting behind closed doors, the Board of County Commissioners on Monday for more than two hours discussed financial affairs of the county with members of the Grand Jury at the last session of court in order to explain to the investigating body the cost of some of the recommendations of the Grand Jury and to learn the sentiment of members of this body in regard to carrying out the recommendations after the cost had been made known to them.

According to reports of the executive session, the board read figures submitted by auditors to show that

it would cost in the neighborhood of \$5,000 to audit the offices of the county for a five year period, as was recommended by the Grand Jury, and gave an opinion from the Attorney General which in substance was that the county had no authority to publish the names of relief beneficiaries, as was also recommended by the Grand Jury at the last term of court. In addition, it was said, the board explained why there had been an increase in the county-wide tax rate, pointing out the cost to the county of provisions of the Social Security Act, the 5-cent increase in the school rate, the cost of a sewer system for the John R. Hawkins school, the cost of an additional building for

the John Graham school, and the cost to this county of bills passed by the last General Assembly.

The board decided at its February meeting to ask the members of the Grand Jury who will serve at the May term of court to appear here this week in order that the financial problems might be gone into and sentiment might be ascertained as to carrying out the rec. ommendations.

So far as could be learned following the executive session, members of the Grand jury were sympathetic throughout the meeting and asked a number of questions bearing on the financial status of the county but made no promises one way or the other in regard to carrying out the recommendations or failing to carry them out.




