The contract for the Ford chassis was awarded to Boyd-Boyce Motor Co. at a cost of approximately \$700.

It is expected that the new fire i \$100.00 for the purchase of engine will be delivered to Warrenton within the next 60 days.

The Roanoke Company pump was selected from a list of six by the Fire Committee composed of W. R. such rules and regulations as Strickland, chairman; George Scoggin and Bignall Jones, on Monday at noon, and was the unanimous choice of the board of commission-
