

Weldon Dumps Warrenton By 27-0 Here Friday Night

Weldon's Tornadoes racked up their second conference win in as many weeks here on Friday night as they whipped an outmanned Warrenton eleven by a 27-0 score.

The win was the second for the defending conference champions, who last week got by the improved Mills High club of Louisburg by a 26-19 count.

Led by a second-string full-back, Ralph Blowe, Weldon picked up 318 yards rushing over the smaller Warrenton club. Blowe, filling in for injured Lucky Mitchell, galloped for three touchdowns and 175 of the Weldon ground yardage.

Warrenton, unable to gain substantially on the ground, never threatened but once—when Sophomore End Hernan Rooker made a diving catch on the Weldon four-yard stripe. Four plays later the Jackets had lost yardage and Weldon took over on their own seven yard line.

Warrenton gained 92 yards on the ground and added an additional 64 yards to their total through the airways. Weldon played the entire game

without picking up any passing yardage. Playing without the services of their head mentor, Ike Davis, who was undergoing a hospital examination, Weldon moved a step further in their quest of the second Tar-Conference crown behind the instructions of assistant coach Jack Joyner.

Weldon took the opening kickoff after winning the toss, but after running only two plays, fumbled with Warrenton

grabbing the pigskin. Warrenton found the fumbling fever was contagious and dropped the ball with Weldon recovering on the the Warrenton 38. Blowe and Senior Quarterback Johnny Wise furnished the running and in seven plays Weldon had scored with Blowe cracking over from five yards out. Wise ran the extra point across.

Warrenton took the ensuing kickoff and marched upfield behind two first downs before

attempting a pass which Weldon intercepted on their 35-yard line and ran to the Warrenton 27.

Six plays later Larry Merritt raced into paydirt from 18 yards away and came back to jog across with the extra point and give Weldon a 14-0 lead.

Late in the second quarter Wise intercepted another wayward Jacket aerial and after a quick first down Blowe broke loose over tackle and outdis-

tanced the Warrenton secondary as he raced 80 yards for a touchdown.

Wise again called on Merritt for the extra point attempt which was good and which gave Weldon a 21-0 halftime lead.

Taking the second half kickoff Warrenton racked up five first downs with the pass to Rooker being the key play in the series. Weldon's defense braced to repulse the Jackets' threat and the game became a see-saw battle until the final quarter when Weldon took over on the Warrenton 48. Eight plays later Blowe scored his third touchdown of the day as he drove over from the three yards out. The score was set up by a 21-yard end sweep by Merritt.

Championship Golf Tournament To Be Held At Warrenton Club

Qualifying rounds for the champion golf tournament to be held in five years are now being posted at the Warrenton Golf Course.

The fall golf tournament for ladies and men and other flight matches will be played during the month of October, Duke Miles, chairman of the activity committee of the Warrenton Country Club, announced this week.

Not since 1954 has the local club offered a championship tournament for both men and women. That year Mrs. Margaret Williams won over Mrs. Helen Banzet and Jimmy Harris defeated Lloyd Cooke to become club champions.

Mrs. Lucy Burwell was the club ladies' champion for a number of years before being dethroned by Mrs. Helen Banzet in 1940. Mrs. Banzet was the club champion until she was beaten by Mrs. Williams in 1954.

Alpheus Jones was king of the local links in 1929. Tom Burton won in 1937. Lloyd Cooke in 1938, Pett Boyd in 1939, and Billy Peete in 1940. Pett Boyd regained the championship in 1941, but Graham Boyd crowned the men's champion in 1942. Cooke won the next tournament which was staged in 1953.

Miles said that the tournament was arranged by the activity committee which is composed of Mrs. Helen Banzet, Mrs. Ida Taylor, Raymond Harris, Monroe Gardner and F. M. Drake.

In addition to mapping out the tournament details, the

committee also arranged for a family night to be held on October 18.

A Halloween Dance to be held at the club on October 31 was planned by the committee members. Playing at the dance will be the famous combo of Woody Hayes. Plans are also being worked out for a ladies night in the near future, along with a younger set dance and a gala New Year's dance.

6. Shall the State of North Carolina contract a new debt on behalf of the State by the issuance of \$466,000 State Training School Capital Improvement Bonds of the State of North Carolina for capital improvements at the State's correctional institutions?
7. Shall the State of North Carolina contract a new debt on behalf of the State by the issuance of \$140,000 State Blind Rehabilitation Center Capital Improvement Bonds of the State of North Carolina for capital improvements at the State's Blind Rehabilitation Center?
8. Shall the State of North Carolina contract a new debt on behalf of the State by the issuance of \$500,000 North Carolina State Ports Bonds of the State of North Carolina for Port facilities at Southport, Brunswick County North Carolina?
9. Shall the State of North Carolina contract a new debt on behalf of the State by the issuance of \$250,000 Historical Sites Construction and Restoration Bonds of the State of North Carolina?
The bonds referred to in each of the foregoing questions have been authorized by Chapter 1038 of the 1959 Session Laws of North Carolina entitled:
"An Act to authorize the issuance of bonds of the State to provide for capital improvements for State institutions and agencies and State aid to community colleges and for local hospital construction, subject to a vote of the qualified voters of the State."
Under instructions from the State Board of Elections the registration books for this special bond election will open on Saturday, October 3rd, 1959, at nine o'clock at the polling places, and remain open until sunset on Saturday, October 17th. The various registrars in the county will be at their polling places for registering voters on the three Saturdays of October 3rd, October 10th and October 17. Those persons now registered do not have to register again in order to vote in this special election.
The polls for said election will be open from 6:30 A. M. to 6:30 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.
