

Paving Being Laid On Super Highway

A large construction crew has been busy since the middle of September laying concrete for the new super highway from a point near the Virginia line to a point near Henderson, covering some 18 miles. About eight miles of one lane of the highway was completed on Monday afternoon. Work, held up by bad weather, is expected to be resumed on Monday.

The road leaves Highway No. 1, 0.6 of a mile south of the Virginia line and runs by Oine to Henderson. The road is of concrete construction, with eight inches of concrete over 4 inches of aggregate, and each of the divided lanes is 24 feet wide, with a dividing strip between each double-lane highway.

Concrete has been poured on one of the double lanes to a point about a mile west of Oine. After this lane is completed work will be started on the second lane. Then entries will have to be paved, and shoulders graded. The road is not expected to be open for travel until some time next summer.

H. M. Williams, Jr., of Route 3, Warrenton, was re-elected as first alternate, and William R. Brauer of Route 1, Norlina, was named second alternate. Alternates serve only when elevated to committee membership to fill a vacancy.

Conservation Reserve Sign-Up Again Extended

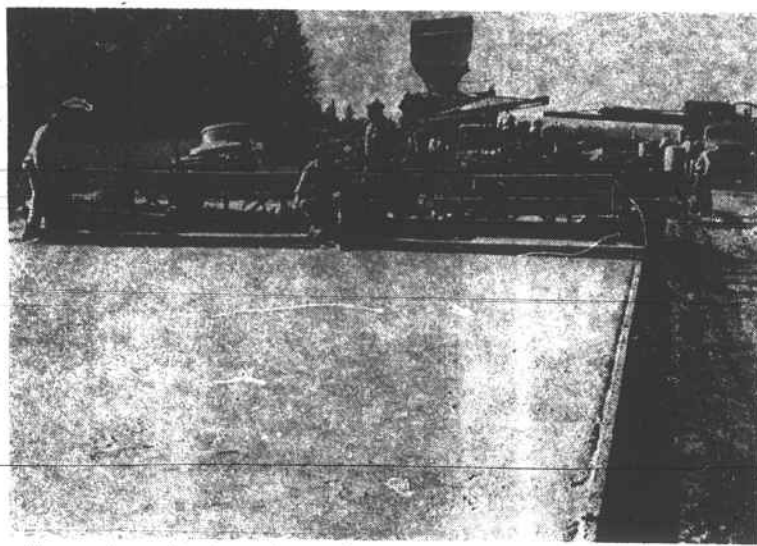

Oliver To Preach At Gardner's Church Sunday

The Rev. Howard Hunter Oliver, Professor of the New Testament at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary at Wake Forest, will be the guest minister at Gardner's Baptist Church at Churchhill on Sunday morning, October 4, at 11 o'clock, the Rev. Leroy Stewart, pastor, announced yesterday.

The 29-year-old minister was educated at Murphy High School and Howard College in Alabama, received his B.D. degree at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1955, the Th.D. degree at Princeton Theological Seminary in 1955, and is completing requirements for Ph.D. degree at Emory University.

Mr. Oliver was pastor of Catherine Baptist Church, Catherine, Ala., 1950-51; pastor of Providence Baptist Church, Titus, Ala., 1950-51; research assistant, International Greek New Testament Project, Emory University, Georgia, 1955-57.

He is a member of the Society of Biblical Literature and Exeges since 1953; a member of National Association of Biblical Instructors since 1953. His Th.M. thesis won a 1954-56 prize of the Christian Research Foundation, Inc.

Mr. Oliver made a European trip during the summer of 1956 under the auspices of the International Greek New Testament Project. This was for the purpose of studying New Testament manuscripts. He also attended the annual meeting of the Society of New Testament Scholars held at Utrecht, Holland, in September, 1956.

Warren County Fair To Begin Here On Monday

The 21st annual Warren County agricultural fair is scheduled to get underway here on Monday.

C. M. Bullock, manager of the Lions-sponsored fair association, said yesterday that the fair would begin on Monday morning and would continue through Saturday night, October 10.

Bullock, in his first year as fair manager, said that this year's fair promised to be one of the best ever staged on the Warrenton Fairgrounds, located west of Warrenton on the Warrenton-Norlina highway.

Playing the midway will be the Endy Shows, which put on the first two performances staged by the Warrenton Lions Club in 1935 and 1936.

World War II caused an interruption in the yearly festivities, but since the end of the war the fair has grown until it has received statewide recognition as one of the best small fairs in the state.

An outstanding event of this year's fair will be the two school days, Bullock said. Wednesday is white school day while Thursday has been set aside for the Negro school pupils of the county.

On both days students will be admitted free and fairway rides will be lower in price. In an effort to promote the educational aspect of this year's fair, the Warrenton Lions Club will offer a prize to the teacher conducting the largest number of pupils through the fair's exhibit hall on each school day. This is the first year that such a prize has been offered, Bullock said.

Prizes worth an approximate \$200 will be given children during the two school days and a Junior Calf Show will be featured.

Canned food, produce, cooked articles, knitting, and a host of other articles have been pouring into the exhibit hall since Monday and members of the association are confident of one of the largest displays of craftsmanship since the fair began here in 1935.

The food booth in the fair building will be operated by the American Legion Auxiliary. (See FAIR, page 12)

Officers Fight Fire At Bootlegger's Home

Members of the Warren County Sheriff's Department spotted Wilkins selling shots of whiskey to friends on his front porch. Chewing sneaked into the house as Wilkins walked back into the house to pour out the whiskey.

Upon spotting the deputy, Wilkins threw the whiskey at the stove, where it broke and set the room on fire. After the fire was put out Wilkins was arrested and charged with possession of non-tax-paid liquor for the purpose of sale.

Earlier Saturday, members of the Sheriff's Department arrested two other Negroes on the same charge.

Richard "Homer" Bruce of near Warrenton and a neighbor, Henry Dunston, were both arrested after rading officers found them in possession of a quantity of illegally manufactured whiskey.

Bruce was arrested when officers found seven jars of whiskey in a house near Bruce's home, and shortly after that Dunston was arrested when deputies uncovered three jars of moonshine in a closet at his home.

Guest Shot In Stomach By Irate Host Saturday

Approximately 40 invited guests at a barbecue supper near Arcola Saturday night caught a glimpse of bad manners when their host fired a pistol bullet into the stomach of one of the guests.

The host, Wilson Hedgepeth, middle-age Negro of near Arcola community, told members of the Warren County Sheriff's Department that he fired a single shot from his 22 calibre revolver after a guest, James West, had struck him, knocked him down, and later had flung a pop bottle at him.

The bullet missed its mark and struck West's brother, Robert West, in the stomach. The latter was seriously hurt and was rushed to Duke Hospital in Durham. Charges against Hedgepeth have not been filed as yet, pending the outcome of West.
