

Terry Sanford Makes Talk Here

Public Education will be the dominant issue in his campaign for Governor, Terry Sanford of Fayetteville, told a small but representative meeting of Warren County citizens at Hotel Warren on Monday afternoon.

Sanford was introduced by General Claude T. Bowers who called the meeting and who praised Sanford and his ability to get things done.

Sanford said that he would make his formal announcement as a candidate for Governor early in February and would set up state headquarters and announce his state campaign manager. He said his appearance at Warrenton was in the nature of a get-acquainted meeting prior to his formal announcement.

In traveling over the state in the interest of his campaign, Sanford said that his chief gain was the opportunity to draw ideas from the people for the advancement and develop-

ment of the state.

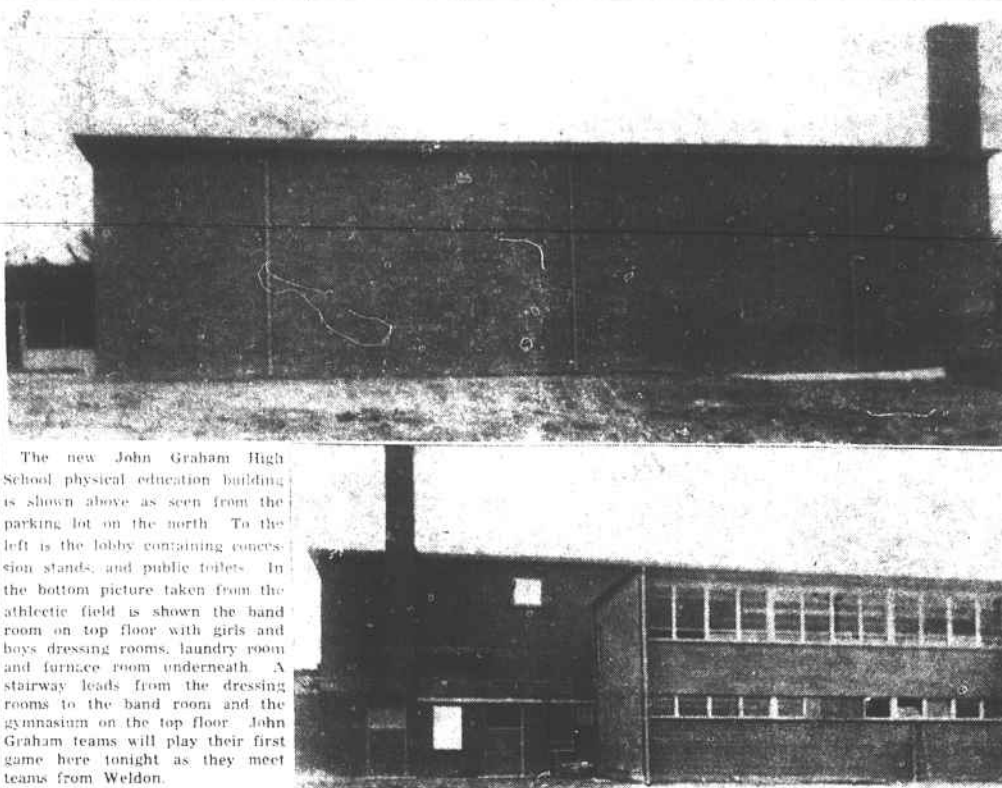
Sanford said that while public education would be the dominant issue in his campaign, two other issues must go hand in hand with the promotion of better education facilities for the boys and girls of the state. In order to broaden the base for financial support of the schools it is necessary to increase the income of the people through a continuing effort to attract industry and through improvement of the people.

Agriculture is still the prime source of our income and the importance of agriculture will not decline with the growth of industry, he said. In fact, he added, better opportunities for farmers for a richer life lie ahead.

While many people have the feeling, Sanford continued, that farm aid has become a federal project and that there is little that the state can do, this is an error. Even as the prestige of the Governor's office has been successfully thrown behind the campaign for industrial development of the state, in the same manner it may be thrown behind a movement to improve agriculture in the state. If elected governor, this he pledged to do.

Sanford said that there were many other important issues to be decided by the people of North Carolina and that many of these would be discussed by him as the campaign developed.

Accompanying Sanford to Warrenton and presented to the group were Burt Bennett of Winston-Salem, who Sanford intimated would be his campaign manager, and Woodrow Teague of Raleigh.

Local School To Play First Game In New Gym Tonight At 7:30

The Warren County School System has accepted the John Graham High School new physical education building and the first basketball game is scheduled to be played there tonight when John Graham hosts Weldon.

In approving acceptance of the main contract, the county withheld \$2,000, until completion of some minor contracts.

Roger Peeler, superintendent of schools, said yesterday the heating, plumbing and electric contracts have not been completed. Peeler said on Wednesday, but the building will be ready for play tonight even if some minor heating and plumbing details are not completed. Peeler stressed the fact that the parking lot adjacent to the

gym has not been completed and that the gate to this lot would be opened tonight. Persons desiring to attend the game are asked to park on Main and Ridgeway streets and walk from the school to the physical education building.

Peeler said that a short dedicatory exercise would be held tonight. This will probably take place during the half-time period of the girls game. Owen Smith, architect, will speak briefly and the Rev. Troy Barrett, local Methodist minister, will give a dedicatory prayer.

The gym floor was completed at the end of last week, and Monday a crew began the erection of glass backboards at the

ends of the playing court. Wooden cross-coat backboards are expected to have been erected before tonight.

Football bleachers have been brought into the building to serve as temporary seats and probably chairs will be brought in to be used until such time as permanent seats can be constructed and placed.

Members of the Boosters Club were busy yesterday stocking the concession stand in the gym lobby, where soft drinks, popcorn, and other articles are scheduled to be on sale.

Work on the physical education building was started here last spring.

Burroughs Rites To Be Held Here This Afternoon

William Hamner Burroughs, age 76 years died in the Warren General Hospital at 11:35 a. m. Wednesday, January 20, after a lingering illness. He had been critically ill for the past month.

Mr. Burroughs was a member of the Wesley Memorial Methodist Church which he had served as Steward for a number of years, part of which time as chairman. He had served a number of terms on the Warren County Board of Commissioners also served as chairman a number of years.

Mr. Burroughs was for several years Chief of the Warren Fire Company and for 40 years or more owned and operated the Burroughs Grocery Company with his brother, Stephen, who died several years ago. Declining health forced him to retire a year or more ago.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Wesley Memorial Methodist Church at 3 o'clock this afternoon (Friday). The pastor, the Rev. Troy Barrett, will conduct the last rites. He will be assisted by the Rev. John Link and the Rev. Lawrence Baxter. Interment will be in Fairview Cemetery in Warrenton.

Mr. Burroughs is survived by a sister, Miss Mary Russell Burroughs.

Ponds And Streams Are Being Stocked

Warren County streams and ponds are being stocked with fish by the North Carolina Wildlife Commission.

Allan Pridden, local Game Protector, said yesterday that during the past two weeks the Commission had stocked Warren County streams with 42,000 Robins, and put 10,000 Blue Gills in Rider's Mill pond. He said that the dam has been rebuilt and that the pond would be completely restocked. Pridden also called attention to the damage done to deer by dogs in the closed season, and said that it was unlawful to allow dogs to run or chase deer during the closed season.

Doe deer heavy with young, Pridden said, are helpless when attacked by dogs and for this reason it is very important that dogs be kept up during the closed season. He said that the deer season is now closed and will not be reopened until next fall.

using loud speakers, \$5.00; auctioneers, \$25.00; bowling alleys, \$10.00 an alley; carnivals and rides, \$50.00; cigarette dispensaries, \$10.00; circuses, horse and dog shows, \$5.00; laundries, \$12.50; motor vehicle dealers, \$10.00 and \$12.50; music machines, \$5.00; peddles, \$25.00; pool and billiard tables, \$20; service stations, \$5.00; sewing machine salesmen, \$5; stamps for trading, \$100.00.

Among the bids which have been asked and which will be opened at Raleigh by the State Highway Commission on February 2 are bids for fencing and erection of signs on 17.66 miles of I-85 in Vance and Warren County, from Henderson north to a point approximately one mile south of the Virginia line, and the fencing of this route.

Project I-85 is the No. 1 by-pass now under construction in northern Vance and Warren Counties.

Recreation Plans Are Going Ahead

Plans for a recreational program for the Warrenton area during the summer of 1960 were approved by an advisory group of representative citizens at Hotel Warren on Wednesday night.

Charles Katzenstein, chairman of the steering committee appointed at a mass meeting on December 2, presided over the meeting and laid before the group recommendations of his committee. With minor changes these were approved by the advisory group.

Present for the meeting was Lonnie Powell, assistant director of the North Carolina Recreation Commission.

Tentative plans call for the setting up of a recreational area to be known as the Warrenton community recreational area which would be the Warrenton school district, to employ a recreational director to conduct a six weeks program at Warrenton beginning on or about June 15.

Under this director baseball, softball, swimming, and other sports and possibly arts and crafts would be offered this summer to boys and girls of from 9 to 17 of the school district this year. The newly erected John Graham High School physical education building and the school athletic field would be the center for

the activities.

The director, and probably his wife, would be paid from monies to be raised in a campaign here at an early date under the direction of H. M. Hardy. The committee suggested that a goal of \$1500 should be set to finance the program. After some discussion, the advisory group held that no definite goal should be set at the present time, but at a meeting to be held as soon as project chairmen could study and report their needs.

While swimming, softball, baseball, tennis, arts and crafts were suggested as parts of the summer program, the group agreed that what recreational projects would be carried out would also have to be determined after further study.

Chairman Katzenstein said that the purpose of the meeting was to inform the group of the recommendation of the steering committee and to obtain its advice.

The Rev. Troy Barrett, one of the instigators of the movement for a recreational program here, said that he was much encouraged by the interest shown and the action taken by the group at the meeting and that a good start has been made toward obtaining the program here this summer.

Serving with chairman Katzenstein on the steering committee are Roy Dixon, Mrs. William Taylor, the Rev. Troy Barrett, the Rev. John Link, Mayor W. A. Miles, and Mrs. Dixon Ward.

Some 25 persons were present for the two-hour meeting.

M. C. McGuire Dies At Hospital Thursday A. M.

Milton Cayce McGuire, 66, died at Warren General Hospital at 12:45 a. m. Thursday, as a result of cerebral hemorrhage which he suffered at the Warrenton Golf Club on Tuesday afternoon.

Surviving are his wife, the former Winifred McWhorter of Roxboro, to whom he was married in January, 1958. He was first married to Elizabeth Boyd Jones of Warrenton who died in 1954. In addition to his widow he is survived by one sister, Mrs. Annie L. Martin of Stamford, Conn., and a number of nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be conducted from Emmanuel Episcopal Church Saturday at 11:00 a. m. The rector, the Rev. Lawrence Baxter, will conduct the last rites and interment will be in Fairview Cemetery in Warrenton.

Mr. McGuire, until his recent retirement, was for many years employed by American Suppliers, Inc., and was well known in tobacco circles. He was active in the civic affairs of Warrenton, being a charter member and a past president of the Warrenton Country Club, a charter member of the Lion's Club, a member of Johnston-Caswell Lodge No. 10 A. F. & A. M., and a member of the Sudan Temple Shrine. Mr. McGuire served many terms as vestryman and was a former Senior Warden of Emmanuel Episcopal Church.

Assigned Job To Get Land For Gaston Reservoir

Wilbur J. Schneider, assistant real estate manager for the Virginia Electric and Power Company, has been assigned to Warrenton where his duties will involve land procurement for the proposed Gaston Dam reservoir.

Schneider came to Warrenton on Tuesday of last week but will not move his family to Warrenton until after the middle of February. He has an office in Hotel Warren as does Parker Little, Stone and Webster engineer, engaged in the platting of property in the reservoir.

Schneider came to Warrenton from Elizabeth City where he was manager of the Electric Virginia and Power Company. Notice of his appointment as assistant real estate manager and his new assignment was given by R. H. Goodwin, southern division vice president. The appointment is effective February 1.

Veeco has an application pending with the Federal Power Commission requesting a license to construct a 200,000 kilowatt hydroelectric station on the Roanoke River, near Gaston. Construction of the \$150,000,000 project is expected to start as soon as authorization is granted.
