

# Much Huffing And Puffing But The Games Got Played

They huffed and they puffed and they nearly brought the house down.

The huffers and the puffers were parents and teachers of the John Graham High School, who donned basketball gear on last Friday night in a contest to raise funds to buy equipment for the baseball team. The house which was nearly brought down by the uproarious laughter of a crowd that filled it almost to capacity was the John Graham High gym.

Saturday the huffers and the puffers bore sore muscles and

a feeling of satisfaction that they had aided in netting more than \$250 for the baseball team.

Time may have slowed the speed that once flashed across high school basketball courts and somewhat dimmed the shooting eye and affected the soft touch of yore, lungs and legs may have felt the strain of combat, and let's face it, sometime pounds had been added in a not-too-judicious manner, but the will to play and the enthusiasm of yesterday was present.

The ladies game, in which the teachers were victors by the score of 37 to 25, showed flashes of skill and considerable comedy, much of it planned. Adding to the fun were the antics of adult cheerleaders.

Nellie Gardner led the teachers to victory with a respectful 17 points. Sue King, wife of the coach of the varsity team, also hit in double figures with 11 points. Ida Taylor, with 11 points, was the high scorer for the parents.

Substitution was frequent and needed. No one fouled out, but this may have been due to the discriminating but good refereeing of Alpheus Jones and Leonard Daniel.

In contrast to the battle of the ladies, the men's game was a serious affair and any comedy shown was a by-product of play. The game was a see-saw affair as teams were shuttled in and out by the parents who held a predominance of bench strength. The parents used a total of 14 players while the teachers could only muster 7. But the teachers held an edge in youthfulness.

Dr. Sam Massey, former Smithfield High player, sank the first basket, quickly followed with a second by Allen Tucker, while a tight zone defense held the teachers scoreless for five minutes. The teachers spurred when the zone was broken by the substitution of a new parents' team and led at half-time by the score of 8 to 4. The parents came back in the second half to cut the score to 14 to 12, but in the third quarter the teachers bore down and netted 10 points, while holding the parents to 3 points and held a 9 point edge at the end of the third quarter.

It may have been that lack of subs took its toll of the teachers or it may have been that parents became fired with zeal in the fourth quarter. That's speculation, but the fact is that the parents staged a rally, scored 16 points in the final quarter while holding the teachers to 6 and won

the game in a Garrison finish by the score of 31 to 30.

With only one second left on the clock, the teachers held a one-point lead and tasted victory for a moment. But they reckoned without the spirit of the parents who had little time but ball possession. Outside the court, Duke Mjles made a perfect throw in to Wade Medlin who swished the ball through the net as the horn sounded ending the game.

Medlin was hoisted to the shoulders of his teammates and paraded around the floor and was nearly mobbed by supporters of the parents. It is alleged that he was hugged and kissed by the women, and efforts were made to get pieces of his clothing for souvenirs, but of this the reporter knows nothing of his own knowledge.

# Norlina Eliminated In Second Round Playoffs

Norlina's conference winning basketball team was eliminated in the second round of playoffs at Rocky Mount on Thursday night of last week when they bowed to Jackson by the score of 74 to 62.

Weldon, runner-up in tournament play, was defeated by Red Oak in the same night's play by the score of 41 to 25.

Jackson took a first quarter lead, 20 to 8, and although Norlina surged back in the second quarter to come within 2 points of tying the score, they were behind 29 to 27 at the half. In the third quarter, Jackson increased its lead to 16 points and Norlina was unable to overcome this handicap.

Four trouble handicapped Norlina with both Fuller and Stegall fouling out in the final quarter. Fuller, usually counted on for many baskets, accumulated 4 fouls in the first half and was held to a total of 7 points for the night. There was only a difference of one field goal in the night's play, as Jackson netted 28 to Norlina's 27, but the margin of victory came on the foul line.

# Local Public Welfare Services Are Evaluated At Board Meet Monday

The Warren County Welfare Board conducted its annual evaluation of Public Welfare services in the county on Monday night. Members of the Board are Charles M. White, III, Chairman of the Board; Alfred J. Ellington; and William J. Leach. Also participating in the meeting were Julian W. Farrar, Superintendent of Public Welfare and Mrs. Idon Russell of the State Welfare Department.

In reviewing the welfare department's work, the board commended the agency staff for reviewing, within established time limits, all of the public assistance cases carried by the agency. All Old Age Assistance recipients are visited at least once a year as are persons receiving Aid to the Permanently Disabled. Persons receiving Aid to Dependent Children's grants are interviewed at least twice a year to assure that eligibility requirements are met.

The Welfare Board was concerned that the number of agency staff members is the same as it was eight years ago even though the work of the department has increased considerably. The department needs additional case workers and clerical staff members. Salaries of employees are at the minimum although training, experience, and length of service is considerable.

Public assistance grants in Warren County are far below the Statewide average for these programs. The aged persons who are in need and receiving Old Age Assistance receive \$4.06 less than the State average per month. Dependent children who are eligible for assistance receive \$4.63 less than State average for the Aid to Dependent Children program.

Five children who are in the custody of the Welfare Department by reason of court orders are cared for in the five foster homes in Warren County which are licensed by the State Board of Public Welfare.

Other responsibilities which are carried by the local Welfare Department include study and investigation of school attendance cases which are reported by the local school principals, arrangements for psychological examinations given by psychologists from the State Welfare Department, cooperative work with the juvenile court when requested by the Judge of that court and adoptive placements of children. Cooperative work with State Hospitals, State Training Schools, the Crippled Children's program, and other social agencies was also reviewed by the Welfare Board and felt to be handled as well as could be expected with the limited agency staff.
