

Facilities Jammed At Parks On Lake

HENDERSON — The visitation to Kerr Lake over the past weekend was probably the heaviest since the lake has been in existence and if this is any indication, then the coming season will be something to see.

Parking, picnicking and camping facilities filled to overflowing over the entire Nutbush area portion of the reservoir, and each concession area reported doing the largest volume of business yet, including previous holiday weekends, as well as having the largest crowds.

The ski show at Townsville Landing attracted quite a few people and Woodie Daves at Palmer Point Marina reported that his regular customers attended it. Despite this fact, his business was still the largest he has had. Daves also stated that his son, Woodie, Jr., had caught sixteen largemouth bass this past week ranging in size from three to seven pounds.

Flemingtown Road Marina and Tarheel Marina reported similar visitation and business.

The Nutbush Bridge camping area was filled early Saturday morning and latecomers had to be directed to other camping spots. Satterwhite Point Park and Bullockville Park were filled with picnickers, boaters, swimmers, and sightseers. Undoubtedly the pretty weather played a big part in the visitation as many of the visitors were from outside of the local area such as Kinston, Hillsboro, Graham, Raleigh, Durham, and Greensboro.

The Carolina Sailing Club had their sailboat races at Satterwhite Point and held their meeting and dinner in Henderson Saturday night.

The lake elevation on Monday, May 23, was 302.50 and the water temperature has warmed up to 75 degrees at five feet beneath the surface.

The Corps of Engineers has begun construction of a central wash house in the camping area near the dam, and a fairly large area has been set up for use by group campers such as large numbers of Scouts. Work was started this week at Satterwhite Point on the beach change houses which consist of dressing booths where the swimmers can change their clothes. This will relieve the situation of changing from clothes to swimming suits in the toilets of the community building or cars.

A word to boaters: Be extremely careful in approaching shores where there are swimmers, particularly when towing skiers. See paragraph 21 of the Motorboat Owners guide issued by the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission.


