

Norlina Boys Take Both Games In Double-Header

Norlina's Little League and Pony League teams took both games in a double-header with Warren Plains on Saturday afternoon. The little fellows remained undefeated with an easy 10 to 3 win, while the Pony Leaguers won the rubber game of a five game series, edging their opponents 4 to 3.

Little League
After Warren Plains had scored one in the first, Norlina put the game on ice with six runs in their half on two hits, three hit batsmen and two walks.

Raymond Vaughan led at bat with a triple and single in three trips. Charles Draffin and Larry King had triples in a four-run second inning. Sydney King singled to drive in two runs in the first.

Jimmie Rivers, who relieved Overby in the third, held Norlina scoreless the rest of the way. He and Bartholomew had two hits each to lead Warren Plains at bat. H. Stegall had Warren Plain's other hit.

Leroy King and Calvin Seaman divided pitching duties for Norlina, allowing five scattered hits. Robert Brantley caught. Stegall caught for Warren Plains.

Pony League Game
Although out hit 8 to 4, Norlina managed a 4 to 3 win over Warren Plains, scoring the winning run with a hit in

the sixth inning. With one out, Buck Wiggins drew a base on balls, stole second and third and scored when Frank Weaver grounded to short and Bartholomew's throw to the plate was late.

Norlina opened the scoring with one run in the first when Andrew Hundley led off with a single, stole second and scored on Johnny Mayfield's single to right.

Warren Plains evened things up in the second when Jimmie Overby doubled, stole third and scored on a passed ball.

Norlina came back with two in the second. Hubie Stegall reached base on an error. Robert Carroll laid down a perfect bunt and beat it out for a single. Hundley grounded out, both runners advancing. Stegall scored on a passed ball and Carroll scored on Charles Mayes' grounder to first.

Although reached for eight hits, Andrew Hundley pitching for Norlina was stingy with men on base, except for the fourth when Warren Plains was able to put together three hits for two runs.

Jimmie Overby of Warren Plains led both teams at bat, with two doubles and a single in three trips. Bartholomew had two for four. Others hitting safely for Warren Plains were Smiley, Twitty and

Leonard.
No Norlina player had more than one hit. Alvin Stegall turned in an excellent pitching job for Warren Plains in a losing cause. B. Stegall caught for Warren Plains; Carroll for Norlina.

Norlina will play teams from Gardeners-Vaughan at Norlina Saturday, June 25. The little League game will start at 2 o'clock.
