Deadline For Grain Loans Announced By ASC Office

Warren County ASC Committee, announced yesterday.

That is the official closing date for price support on barley, grain sorghums, oats, rye, soybeans, and wheat, he said. The loan rates and eligibility standards for 1960-crop com-modities in North Carolina are as follows:
