'Seven Vital Needs' Of Leaf Industry Told Tobacco specialists at N. C. State College have come up with "seven vital needs" of the tobacco industry.

"The future of the tobacco industry, at all levels, depends on gaining active support of all groups who share the responsibility for one phase or another," said Roy Bennett, Extension tobacco specialist.

"Talk won't get the job done—each person and organization must do their part."

In a statement keyed to current meetings with farmers throughout the tobacco-growing regions of North Carolina, Bennett called for "an agri-business partnership" of all agricultural, industrial and allied groups in the industry.

"They must join in a cooperative effort to exercise the leverage that each group has in bringing about improvements," he said.

The "seven vital needs" are: 1. Prices for tobacco that reflect realistically the desirable and undesirable characteristics of tobacco in the market place.

Too frequently, tobacco prices ignore mixed grades, pale slick leaf, thread, large hands and other characteristics that are criticized verbally," said the report from Bennett.

2. Description, by the tobacco grading system, of the quality characteristics of each basket of tobacco for sale.

"The grade should identify desirable and undesirable characteristics that are important to the trade and the consumer," said the report.

Mixture, thread, large hands, slick, lousy and pale tobaccos often may not be identified as such.

3. Reflection, by the price support system, of desirable and undesirable characteristics

of tobacco.

"The support price has a great deal of influence at the market," the report said. "It is just as important for the price support to encourage desirable quality, good handling and other elements as it is for the buyers to do so."

4. A realistic, accurate acreage control program, keyed to effective supply and demand in the domestic and foreign market.

"We must be aware of the effect on our own industry of the quality, price and production costs of tobacco produced in foreign countries," the report said, "and of regulations, laws and tariffs in importing countries."

5. Cooperative support on the part of the tobacco warehousemen and the Department of Agriculture for the use of sound practices in production marketing and in improving and building the tobacco program.

6. Constant supply of up-to-date answers and information by N. C. State College, through its basic and applied research extension program.

"This information needs to be passed on by the Extension and teaching program to the farmers, to all segments of the tobacco industry, and to the people in general," said the report.

7. Full use by the tobacco farmers of proven production and marketing practices, for production of the most desirable quality of tobacco, as efficiently and economically as possible.

"The farmer must have pride in the quality and appearance of his tobacco," said the report. "He needs a proper appreciation for the satisfaction the consumer will get from the use of his tobacco."

"The farmer must select proven varieties, use the best cultural, curing and marketing practices known."

Bennett pointed out that "a sound, healthy, and growing industry cannot be built on what we can get by with at the farm, market or in the processing plant."
