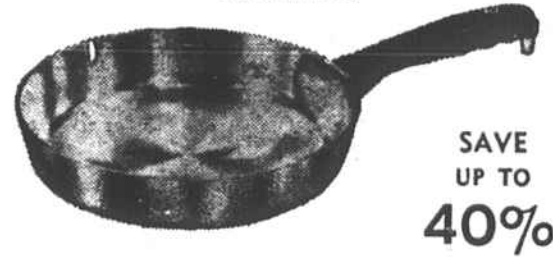
Returns Home
