

Lions District Governor Visits Warrenton Club

The meeting of the Warrenton Lions Club at Hotel Warrenton on last Friday night was featured by the annual visit of District Governor A. D. Pierce of Goldston, governor of district 31G. He was accompanied to Warrenton by Mrs. Pierce, who was a guest of the club.

Governor Pierce discussed the aims of Lionism for this year, stressing the Lions International goal of 100,000 good new members, making Lions International a world-wide organization of more than 700,000 members.

Not only is it necessary to select good members, Lion Pierce said, but to properly introduce them to the club and assign them to committees so they will become indoctrinated with the spirit of Lionism.

Active Lions dedicated to Lionism, he said, could do much for world peace by helping their fellowmen.

The District Governor also announced Lion conventions for the year. He said the mid-winter convention of District 31G would be held in Rocky Mount in January and that the State Lions Convention would be held at Carolina Beach the early part of June. The International Convention will be in Nice, France, the latter part of next June in honor of Lions International President Per Stahl of Sweden, who is Lions International's first European president. A large delegation

from the state and nation is expected to attend this meeting, he said.

The district governor praised the local Lions Club for its work, and said that District 31G, of which the Warrenton Club is a part, was the outstanding district in activities throughout Lions International in 1960-61.

Following the dinner meeting, Governor Pierce met with the board of directors and discussed club activities and goals for the district for the coming year.

President Duke Jones presided over the meeting. Lion Monroe Gardner led in club singing with Lioness Nellie Gardner at the piano. The Rev. E. W. Baxter gave the invocation.

year are: Charlotte, \$662,782.50; Greensboro, \$443,764.28; Winston-Salem, \$367,231.12; Raleigh, \$313,540.29; Asheville, \$261,366.98; Durham, \$250,573.10.

Smallest allocation again this year went to Falkland in Pitt County with an allocation of \$292.02.

In the eleven years in which Powell Bill allocations have been distributed, a total of \$86,157,066.05 has been distributed, and the group of participating municipalities has grown from 386 to 415.

Half of each year's allocation is divided among all qualified municipalities on the basis of relative 1960 U. S. census population. This year's per capita rate is \$1.92 as compared with last year's \$2.30.

The remaining half of the allocation is divided among all qualified municipalities on the basis of relative mileage of non-State System or local streets. This year's per mile rate is \$453.12.

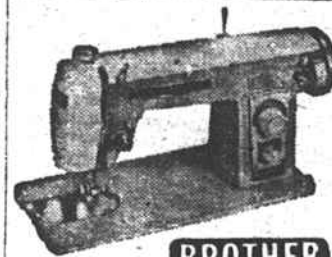
