The Fabric Doctor
"Is It Safe To Have A Contour Belt Drycleaned?"
Asks Miss S. C. P.

Dear Miss S. C. P.:
Fabric covered contour belts, probably, give drycleaners and their customers more headaches than any other single item of apparel. Sometimes the belt backing stiffens or the fabric covering ripples, stains or separates from the backing. Sometimes the eyelets ravel or tear. All this results from the special construction of contour belts.
Drycleaners know that belts of any type present cleaning problems, but contour belts, stitched or unstitched, are especially troublesome. Because they are curved to fit the body at the waist they cannot be sewn in a straight line. Stitched contour belts are made with fabrics stretched over cardboard interlinings, then machine stitched to a plastic backing. Usually eyelets are not stitched and are subject to raveling or tearing. When stitched belts are drycleaned the plastic backing shrinks, making the fabric ripple. Unstitched belts are fastened to cardboard by an adhesive. Unstitched belts often separate from the backing or the adhesive may stain the fabric or the fabric may separate from the buckle.
Your drycleaner should inform you that cleaning of contour belts is extremely hazardous, even when carefully hand-cleaned. They can be cleaned, Miss S. C. P., but the extreme care and extra time that need to be taken may require an extra cleaning charge. Good luck, but don't expect miracles on this tricky item.

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
