(Continued from page 1) may continue in effect.

Under legislative provisions, the Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim a national acreage allotment for cotton whenever he finds that the total supply exceeds the normal supply.

Prospective supplies of cotton for the 1961-62 marketing year are estimated at 21 million running bales, including an August 1, 1961, carryover of almost seven million bales, 1961 crop of 14.2 million bales and estimated imports of 50,000 bales.

The "normal supply" figure of 18.6 bales included estimated domestic consumption of 8.6 million bales and exports of 5.7 million bales, plus a 30 per cent "carryover" reserve of 4.3 million bales.

Thus the prospective total for 1961-62 exceeds the normal supply by about 2.5 million bales, and quotas had to be proclaimed for the 1962 crop of cotton.

Marketing quotas operate through acreage allotments. A grower who exceeds the cotton

acreage allotment for his farm, under a cotton marketing quota program will be subject to a marketing quota penalty of 50 per cent of parity on the farm's excess production. Growers who do not exceed their cotton allotments may market free of penalty all of the 1962 cotton production from their farms. With a marketing quota program, price support to eligible growers will be at a level between 65 and 90 per cent of parity. Without a quota program, support will drop to 50 per cent of parity.

The 1962 allotment notices will be mailed December 5.

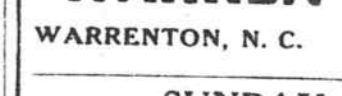
