son of Ellerson and Robert Edward King of Chesterfield.

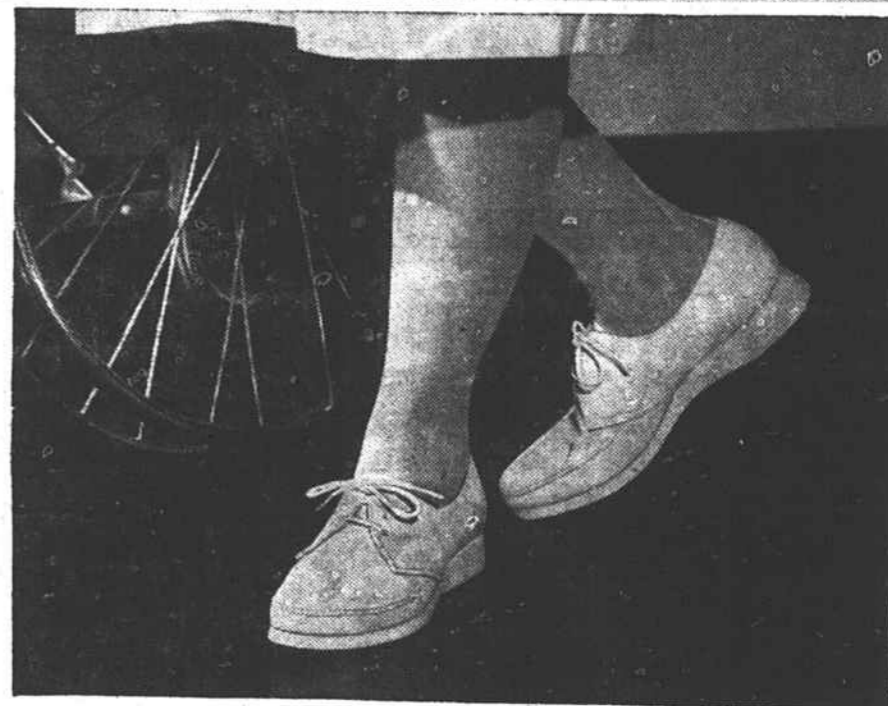
