

Delegation Of 184 HD Club Women Attend Council Meeting In Raleigh

Approximately 3,000 women crowded Raleigh's Memorial Auditorium last Wednesday, March 28, from 52 counties throughout the State, for the 20th Annual Session of the State Council Meeting of Home Demonstration Clubs.

Warren County made an outstanding appearance at the meeting with a delegation of 184 persons. Mrs. Peggy Drew, Negro home economist, who headed the Warren group to Raleigh, said that this was one of the largest groups ever to attend the meeting, among whom were eight husbands of HD Club members, and some ten non-HD Club members.

Mrs. Lizzette Pearsall, retiring president, presided over the first session, which opened at 10:30 a. m. She called attention to the fact that there had never been a greater need for better understanding by the

general public of the work done by the Home Demonstration Clubs than now. She threw out a great challenge to the members when she said, "Are we, as leaders, doing our share in telling the story?"

Mrs. Patricia Johnson Trice, choir director of the A. and T. College Choir, began the meeting with musical preludes. The Rev. Cleo M. McCoy, director of religious activities at A. and T., gave the invocation. The Madrigal Singers, of the same college, furnished the music. Miss Marjorie Murray sang a solo.

Mayor W. C. Enloe brought greetings for the city, and told how all Raleigh awaited the coming of the club women to the city. He made them welcome and told them he looked forward to greeting them next year. Mrs. Nell Kennett, State Home Economics Extension Leader, North Carolina State College, greeted them on behalf of the State Agricultural Extension Services, under whose auspices the program is carried on.

Mrs. Vera Slade, incoming president, reviewed the achievements of the year and pointed out that much had been done.

She also said that she is aware that much more has to be done. Mrs. Lucille Alston aided her in telling the achievement story.

R. E. Jones, State Agent, introduced Dr. John T. Caldwell, Chancellor of North Carolina State College, who delivered the principal address. He gave a very comprehensive and informative speech on the work and broadened the horizon of the home.

Mrs. Irene Booker made the presentations to those who made remarkable records during the year. Mrs. Martha McNair called the roll of coun-

ties. The morning session closed with recognition of guests.

The afternoon session was scheduled to take up the election of officers. Due to the fact that the vice-presidents move up to office according to rank, it was expected that the only battle would be over the election of the second vice-president. The officers of treasurer held by Mrs. Roxie Small; secretary, Mrs. Mildred P. Fowler, and the assistant secretary's place, now filled by Mrs. Geneva Johnson, would be filled by new people. Miss Kennett was slated to install the new officers.

TAX DEADLINE

April 15 is the deadline for filing your 1958 Social Security Taxes. Many of you will need the year 1958 to qualify for your Social Security Insurance Pension.

April 15 is the deadline for filing for refund of gasoline taxes from the State of North Carolina. This refund is in the amount of 6 cents per gallon used in non-highway and farm machinery.

April 15 is the deadline for filing 1961 Federal and State Income Taxes. If you earned \$600 or more and are under 72 years of age, the law requires that you file federal income tax report.

LOOKING AHEAD

Now is the time to get your farm land prepared for seedbed preparation and transplants. Last year, many of you got behind and didn't catch up. Don't blame the weather and season for your poor crops. Be ready to transplant tobacco early. Get your cucumbers in early.
