CHAPEL HILL — William Woodruff Taylor, III, son of Mr. and Mrs. Taylor of Warrenton, has been named one of 49 "superior freshmen" at the University of North Carolina who will pursue a course in honors program.

The Freshman Honors program was established as an experimental venture at the University in 1954 and met with such success that in 1957 the Carnegie Corporation gave a \$100,000 grant for the program's expansion. About 50 students each year are named to it.

The students attend advanced fundamental courses taught by selected faculty members. The courses are meant to be harder and rougher and more demanding than courses for students following the regular college schedule.

Taylor is a graduate of John Graham High School. He intends to major in law at the University.
