TOBACCO FALL CULTURE

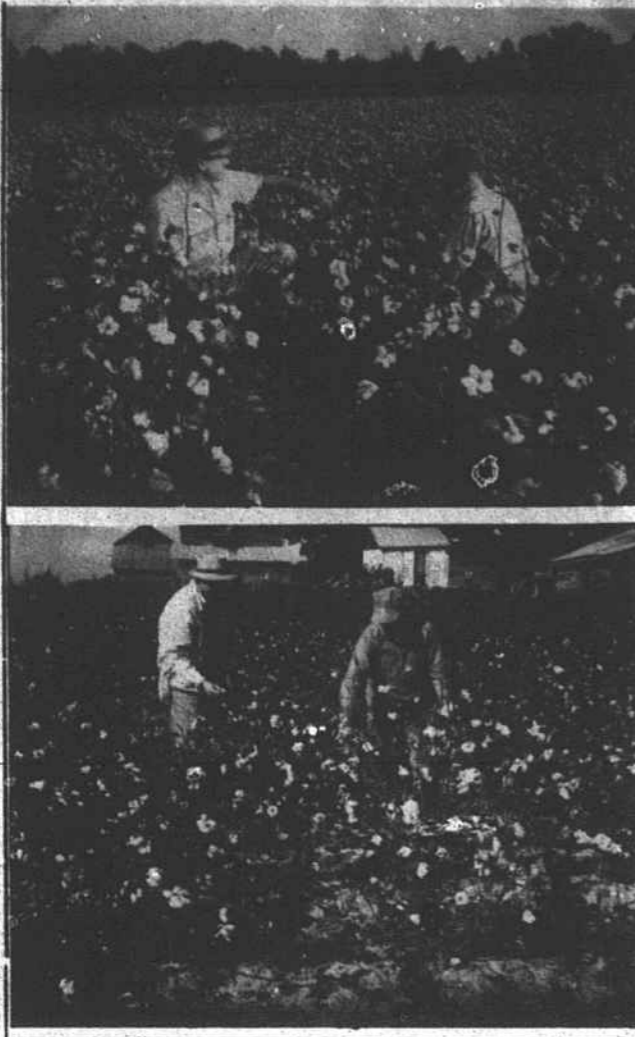
There has been a greater per cent of tobacco stalks cut and turned up this fall than in any previous fall in the history of the county. This is a very profitable trend and will add green backs to your bank account for years to come. You will be a nematode murderer but this is one time you can legally be a murderer and receive commendations for a job well done.

WE CAN PRODUCE COTTON

For proof of this statement, take a close look at the two pictures above. In one picture you see Glenn Toomey, Extension Cotton Specialist, congratulating Frederick Williams on his high cotton yields of some over a bale to the acre and advising him on a few pointers on how to improve the yield next year. Mr. Williams and Taylor Murtin used Karmax pre-emergence weed control and sprayed seven or eight times to hold the boll weevil in check.

In the other picture, you see V. A. Coleman and L. B. Hardage inspecting Mr. Coleman's cotton that will produce some over a bale to the acre. Mr. Coleman used Karmax pre-emergence weed control and treated four times to hold down the parasitic boll weevils. Both these cotton producers are following methods that result in excellent yields. Of course, there is some extra cost but this expense is low compared to the increased income. It is a shame you people have to fight weeds and insects but they are here regardless of our wishes, therefore, if you want profits all you can do is roll up your sleeves and buckle down to the job.
