Candidates Win Place On Town Board

Two former commissioners dropped from the board in the election of two years ago were again placed on the board in Tuesday's election.

In their return to the board Walker P. Burwell received 212 votes, and A. D. Johnson received 211 votes out of a total of 346 votes cost.

Mayor W. A. Miles, running without opposition, polled 246 votes, but his vote was reduced by write-in ballots for ten men as follows: Hugh Holt 1, Sam Warlick 2, Nat Hilliard 1, A. A. Wood 4, Jimmy Roberts 3, S. O. Nunn 3, B. G. White 2, E. T. Odom, Jr. 1, Frank Daniel 1, and Jim Kerr 1.


