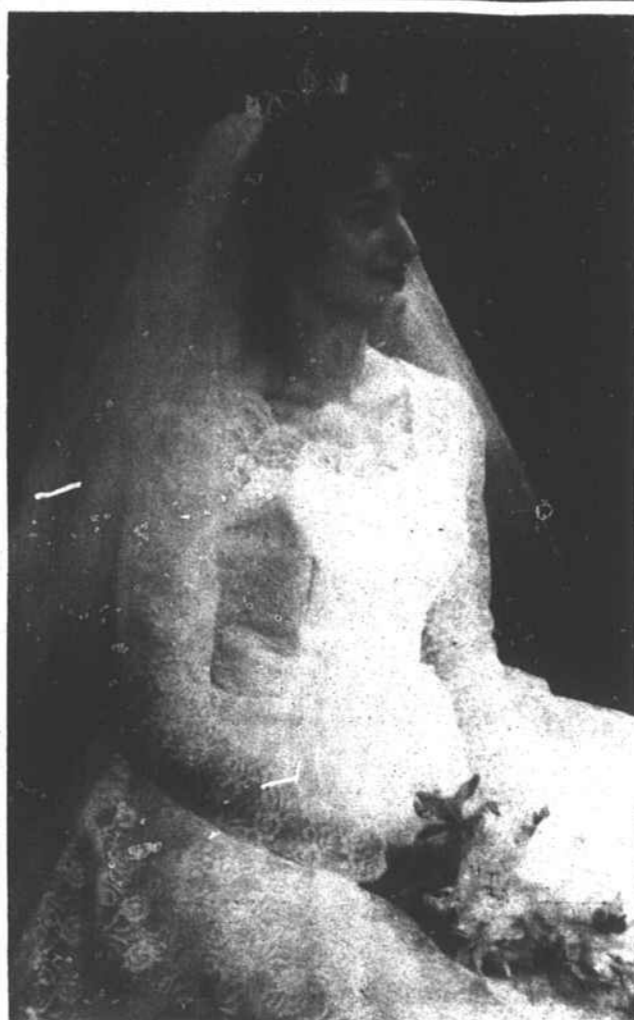
Miss Julia Kelly Given Coffee Hour
