### **Boll Weevils Found** In Farmers' Fields

Warren County farmers, plagued with hail and drought must now contend with the boll weevil and red spider.

Frank Reams, county agricultural agent, said yesterday that boll weevils have been no found in large numbers on worse, Reams said, farmers some farms. He said cotton producers are urged to check their fields, both squares on the stalks and those on the ground. If weevils are found, he added, farmers should continue to treat their fields until bolls are almost grown.

Reams said the presence of these weevils was a surprise in view of the small number of weevils found during the early summer. He said these parasites have somewhat reduced prospects for a bumper
