(Continued from page 1) for temporary grazing crops, Reams said that for winter and spring temporary pasture to be of greatest benefit there must be rapid and vigorous growth. Also, the seeding must be heavy in order to have a thick sod so animals may graze during wet weather. He said that his office is mailing temporary pasture recommendations to many Warren County farmers. Farmers who fail to receive these instructions, he said, may obtain a copy by calling by the extension office in Warrenton.

## LEGAL NOTICES

**AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$110,000 OF BONDS OF THE TOWN OF WARRENTON FOR THE IMPROVEMENT AND ENLARGEMENT OF THE SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM OF THE TOWN.**

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Warrenton, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Warrenton has ascertained and hereby determines that it is necessary that said Town improve and enlarge the sanitary sewer system maintained by the Town by the construction of a plant for the treatment and disposal of sewage, including the installation of a pumping station and force main, together with the acquisition and installation of the necessary equipment, machinery, and apparatus and the acquisition of any lands or rights in land required therefor.

Section 2. Said Board of Commissioners has also ascertained and hereby determines that the purpose hereinbefore described is a necessary expense of said Town within the meaning of Section 7 of Article VII of the Constitution of North Carolina, and is a purpose for which said Town may raise or appropriate money, and is not a current expense of said Town.

Section 3. In order to provide funds for such purpose, in addition to any funds which may be made available for such purpose from any other source, bonds of the Town of Warrenton are hereby authorized and shall be issued pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act, 1921, of North Carolina. The maximum aggregate amount of bonds authorized by this ordinance shall be One-hundred

Ten Thousand Dollars (\$110,000). Section 4. A tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 5. A statement of the debt of said Town has been filed with the Town Clerk and Treasurer of said Town, as required by said Act, and is open to public inspection.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect when approved by the voters of said Town at an election to be called and held as provided in said Act.

The foregoing bond ordinance was passed on the 21st day of August, 1963, and was first published on the 23rd day of August, 1963. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
