Bond Vote Is Almost Solid

178 Vote For Issue, 3 Against

One hundred and eightyone voters went to the polls Tuesday and cast an almost unanimous vote for a bond issue to raise funds for the construction of a sewage treatment and disposal plant here. The vote was 178 for and 3 against. There were no spoiled ballots.

The approved bond issue provided \$110,000 to be added to a \$97,000 grant from the federal government.

Lack of opposition to the bond issue is believed to have been responsible for the light vote. The 18V votes cast Tuesday compared with 265 votes cast in the town election in May.

Mayor W. A. Miles yesterday expressed his gratification for the support given the bond issue by the voters. He said the vote was not unexpected but gratifying.

Mayor Miles said the engineers said that they hoped to have specification ready for a call for bids within the next two or three weeks. He said that he expects that construction on the plant should start around Dec. 1.


