Hopes Rise For Added **Payrolls**

There is a possibility that Warren County may land a new industry in the near future, Selby G. Benton, president of the Bute Develop ment Company, said Thurs-

Benton's announcement folowed in the wake of an ancouncement by Gov. Terry Sanford last week that Littleon is getting two new indusries that will employ approxmately 200 persons. Benton said negotiations are

underway with four separate manufacturing firms which have expressed interest in locating a plant in the county. A delegation of Warren in-

lustry seekers-headed by Carroll V. Singleton, a part-time industry hunter who was credited with locating the two new industries in Littletonis scheduled to meet with officials of one northern manufacturing concern Sunday. Name of the firm was not released.

All four industries now being sought would each employ more than 200 persons, Benton said.
At Littleon, both indus-

tries, Golfers' Sportswear Company, Inc., and the Littleton Manufacturing Company, Inc., will locate in a recently completed industrial building.

Golfers' Sportswear will manufacture ski clothing and ton Manufacturing Company will produce quilted mater-

A New York wearing apparmanufacturer, Aaron Hirschman, will serve as president for both operations.

Hirschman told officials he has been impressed with the cooperative efforts of the community in securing the industrial building project.

The shell building that house the two companies is located on U. S. Highway 158 at the east entrance to Littleton. It has a total of 25,000 square feet and there is room for expansion. It was made possible through the combined efforts of the Littleton Development Co., Carroll V. Singleton and Associates, construction firm of Henderson, and officials of the Commerce and Industry Division of the State Department of Conservation and Development in Raleigh.

The new industries will employ mostly women, although few men will be employed.
