# McKinnon To Preside Over Term

Some 33 defendants are scheduled to go on trial here next week during the January criminal term of Warren County Superior Court. Judge Henry A. McKinnon of Lumberton is expected to open the session at 10 a. m. Monday

Only one capital case has been placed on the calendar for disposal during this term. Clifton Alston, 16-year-old Inez Negro youth, is scheduled to face trial Monday on a charge of rape.

Alston, who will be defended by Warrenton Attorney Charles T. Johnson, was bound over for trial in September by Judge Julius Banzet in Warren County Recorder's Court. However, Alston's case was continued at that term and he has been held in the Warren County Jail for the past four months.

Alston is accused of raping Mary Louise Alston, a 17-yearold Negro girl, in an automobile in the Liberia community on the night of Aug. 21. 1963.
