Reynolds Price, Duke English Frofessor and author of "A Long and Happy Life," and other stories, came home Monday night to the warmth of friendly greetings and plaudits from friends and relatives.

The occasion was the March dinner meeting of the Macon Community Club where Price was guest speaker and discussed his works and why he writes. The meeting, held at Warren Plaza Inn, half-way between Macon where Price was born, and Warrenton where he attended school and later lived, was attended by a number of special including aunts and uncles and cousins of the speaker, close friends, former teach ers, and members of the Macon Junior High School faculty. Also present was Mrs. Will Price, the mother of the speaker, the former Elizabeth Rodwell of Macon.

The invocation was pronounced by the Rev. R. E. Brickhouse, retired minister of the Macon and Warrenton Baptist Churches, attended by Price and his family.

Mrs. Wilton R. Drake, vice president, presided over the meeting and asked that it be made just an informal gathering of friends of Reynolds Price. She recognized several special guests, including Miss Jennie Alston, Mrs. Crichton Thorne Davis, and Mrs. Ersie Stewart, former teachers of Price, who praised Reynolds as a student and expressed their pride in his accomplishments. ### Death Came Mostly To Old In January

Not a single death of a person under 56 years of age was reported in Warren County during January, the Warren County Health Department reported this week.

Eleven of the twelve deaths reported were in the 65 and prover age group, Dr. Robert F. Young, Health Director, said. "This is phenomenal," he said, when one recalls the large number of graves for infants and young people in the older cemeteries in our county."

Heart disease ranked first with seven deaths and cancer next with two. Three deaths were due to unknown causes.

During the month of January 29 live births were reported in Warren County with five white and 24 non-whites, the report stated. Of the 24 non-white infants twelve were delivered by midwives and six by physicians at-homes, with only six having hospital delivery. All of the five white infants were delivered in a hospital. During this period 21 percent of Negro births were illegitimate.
