Bahutu fear and hatred of the Watusi is an old story in Rwanda, the National Geographic Society says. Threeor four centuries ago, Watusis wandered southward, perhaps from Ethiopia or Egypt. Driving herds of lyre-horned cattle. they settled along the green mountain slopes of Rwanda. Indigenous Bahutus working in the fields thought the six - and seven-foot-tall giants were of divine origin and privilege.


