

Suspended Sentence Given In Neal Case

A Warren County man who pled guilty to a number of charges in Warren County Recorder's Court last Friday had a year's road sentence suspended for two years.

Vance Nicholas Neal, charged with speeding, drunk driving, resisting arrest, and assault with an auto, pled not guilty but after all the evidence was presented to a jury charged his plea to using profanity on the public highway within hearing of two or more persons, guilty of speeding 50 miles per hour in a 35-mile zone, guilty of wilfully and unlawfully resisting, delaying and obstructing a public officer in the discharge or attempting to discharge a duty of his office. The State accepted the plea.

Neal was sentenced to the roads for one year, but the sentence was suspended for two years upon the condition defendant not violate any public laws of state for two years, remain of good behavior, keep peace toward all persons, and pay a \$200 fine and court costs.

In other cases, John D. Capps was found guilty of drunk driving and ordered to pay a \$100 fine and court costs.

James Walter Barnes pled guilty to a charge of operating a motor vehicle without an operator's license and was fined \$25.00 and ordered to pay court costs.

Walter David Weaver, who pled guilty to a speeding charge, was ordered to pay court costs.
